MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS

Parliamentary Year 1, No. 39, Session 6

Meeting of the Parliament

Wednesday 27 October 2021

Note: (DT) signifies a decision taken at Decision Time.

The meeting opened at 2.00 pm.

1. Portfolio Questions: Questions on Covid-19 Recovery and Parliamentary Business and then Net Zero, Energy and Transport were answered by Cabinet Secretaries and Ministers.

2. Ministerial Statement: The Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills (Shirley-Anne Somerville) made a statement and answered questions on OECD Education -Next Steps.

3. Global Ambitions for COP26: The Cabinet Secretary for Net Zero, Energy and Transport (Michael Matheson) moved S6M-01769—That the Parliament welcomes the world to Glasgow for the COP26 summit and thanks all those who have contributed to enabling the summit to take place; considers this to be humanity's last opportunity to limit global warming and deliver on the ambitions set at the Paris Climate summit in 2015 and calls on world leaders gathering in Glasgow to make the necessary changes in their own countries to keep the target of 1.5 degrees alive and ensure it is achieved, and also deliver on the funding commitments made in Paris to support countries in the Global South in tackling climate change and its impacts; further calls on world leaders to take immediate and rapid action on emissions reduction and investment in lowemission and zero-carbon technology on a global scale, and to recognise the loss and damage already occurring as a result of climate change, recognising that those suffering most from these changes are those least responsible for it, and to support those countries already living with such loss; notes the commitments recently set out through the Programme for Government, the Cooperation Agreement between the Scottish Government and the Scottish Green Party Parliamentary Group, and other documents that build upon the updated Climate Change Plan and increase the steps being taken in Scotland to address the climate crisis; looks forward to the publication, starting from next year, of sectoral just transition plans, and welcomes the undertaking, in support of this, of further analysis of Scotland's North Sea oil and gas production to assess the compatibility of current and future field development with the Paris Agreement, and to Scotland's economy, security and wellbeing.

Liam Kerr moved amendment S6M-01769.4—

As an amendment to motion S6M-01769 in the name of Michael Matheson (Global Ambitions for COP26), leave out from "the commitments" to end and insert "that the Scottish Government has missed its legal emissions target three times and that, according to the Climate Emergency Response Group, over two thirds of key climate policies are not on track; considers that the Scottish Government and Glasgow City Council have failed to properly prepare Glasgow and Scotland's national transport infrastructure for hosting this global event, and calls upon the Scottish Government to urgently step up its support for making homes more energy efficient, bring forward a Circular Economy Bill, accelerate the roll-out of Scotland's electric vehicle charging network, and invest as a full partner in the North Sea Transition Deal."

After debate, the amendment was disagreed to ((DT) by division: For 32, Against 87, Abstentions 0).

Monica Lennon moved amendment S6M-01769.1—

As an amendment to motion S6M-01769 in the name of Michael Matheson (Global Ambitions for COP26), insert at end "; notes that the Scottish Government has not met the annual target for emissions in 2017, 2018 and 2019; agrees that it is important for Scotland to provide leadership through action and delivery; understands that having better, regular, interconnected and affordable public transport run in the interest of passengers will be essential to achieving the modal shift from cars that will be necessary to meet Scotland's climate ambitions, and calls on the Scottish Government to use all the powers available to it to realise Scotland's full potential in the renewable energy sector, create local green jobs in communities across Scotland, implement a bold industrial strategy to invest in and grow domestic supply chains, and take all necessary steps to secure a just transition to net zero in Scotland, ensuring that no individual, family or community is left behind."

After debate, the amendment was agreed to (DT).

Liam McArthur moved amendment S6M-01769.3-

As an amendment to motion S6M-01769 in the name of Michael Matheson (Global Ambitions for COP26), insert at end "; notes the Scottish Government's commitment to develop an aviation strategy, and believes that, as part of this work, the Scottish Government should withdraw from its written agreement with Heathrow Airport to support the building of a third runway."

After debate, the amendment was disagreed to ((DT) by division: For 12, Against 85, Abstentions 22).

The motion, as amended, was then agreed to ((DT) by division: For 91, Against 27, Abstentions 0).

- 6. Approval of Code of Conduct for Councillors: The Minister for Parliamentary Business (George Adam), on behalf of the Parliamentary Bureau, moved S6M-01798—That the Parliament agrees that the Code of Conduct for Councillors (SG/2021/229) be approved.

The motion was agreed to (DT).

7. Approval of Model Code of Conduct for Members of Devolved Public Bodies: The Minister for Parliamentary Business (George Adam), on behalf of the Parliamentary Bureau, moved S6M-01799—That the Parliament agrees that the Model Code of Conduct for Members of Devolved Public Bodies (SG/2021/230) be approved.

The motion was agreed to (DT).

8. Approval of SSI: The Minister for Parliamentary Business (George Adam), on behalf of the Parliamentary Bureau, moved S6M-01800—That the Parliament agrees that the Forestry (Exemptions) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2021 [draft] be approved.

The motion was agreed to (DT).

9. Designation of Lead Committee: The Minister for Parliamentary Business (George Adam), on behalf of the Parliamentary Bureau, moved S6M-01801—That the Parliament agrees that the Rural Affairs, Islands and Natural Environment Committee be designated as the lead committee in consideration of the Good Food Nation (Scotland) Bill at stage 1.

The motion was agreed to (DT).

10. Decision Time: The Parliament took decisions on items 3, 6, 7, 8 and 9 as noted above.

11. Recognising the Importance of Scotland's Ferry Services: The Parliament debated S6M-01137 in the name of Jamie Halcro Johnston—That the Parliament recognises the vital importance of lifeline ferry links to Scotland's island communities; acknowledges what it sees as the severe problems that have affected Clyde and Hebridean routes, particularly in the Highlands and Islands region, over the summer of 2021; notes the impact on residents, potential visitors, businesses and public services of a service that is unreliable; recalls the conclusions of the Rural Economy and Connectivity Committee in its inquiry into the construction and procurement of ferry vessels in Scotland, and notes the view that there is an urgent need for a Scotland-wide ferries strategy that ensures the resilience of the network into the future.

12. Motion without Notice: Jamie Halcro Johnston moved without notice that, under Rule 8.14.3, the debate be extended by up to 30 minutes. The motion was agreed to.
