**Anniversary**—That the Parliament recognises the 175th anniversary of the Edinburgh to Glasgow railway line, which runs through Polmont in the Falkirk East constituency; understands that the line opened on 21 February 1842 and is now a vital link between the nation's capital and its largest city; considers that, as of 2016, seven million passenger journeys were completed on the line, an average of 62 services every weekday, which shows the progress made since the four services per day in each direction in 1842; further recognises that Scotland's rail network, as it stands today, is still based on the infrastructure put in place in the Victorian era; notes what it sees as t the comprehensive plans put in place by the Scottish Government, including the electrification of the railway and the Edinburgh Glasgow Improvement Programme (EGIP), will see improvements to that infrastructure, giving Scotland a modern rail service for the 21st century, offering faster, more efficient services and major improvements for passengers, and commends the Scottish Government for providing what it considers are the improvements needed for passengers across the country.

\*<u>S5M-04222</u> Peter Chapman: Inverurie Station, Full Steam Ahead for Autism Award—That the Parliament welcomes Inverurie railway station's progress in its aim to become the first autismfriendly station in the UK; understands that it aims to raise awareness and understanding of autism in Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire through activities such as inviting a group of autistic volunteers to the station to talk about the challenges that they can face when travelling and station staff attending an awareness-raising session delivered by the National Autistic Society Scotland; recognises the positive impact this will have on people with autism in the north east, and supports the station in joining Aberdeen FC, Peterhead FC and Sport Aberdeen in committing to achieve its Autism Friendly Award.

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yet again, withdrawing from a community without any meaningful consultation; agrees that such closures have the greatest detrimental effect on disabled, poor and older people as well as fragile small businesses; calls on the TSB to urgently review its decision to close the Maryhill branch; believes that, despite reduced footfall in some branches, there is an imperative to find a way of offering continuity of mainstream banking service provision in the poorest communities, and calls on all tiers of government to work in partnership with the banking sector to identify such a model and to consider introducing regulations that will support banks in meeting what it sees as their obligations to society.
