S5M-09328 Joan McAlpine: The Economic Potential of Robert Burns—That the Parliament welcomes the contribution that Robert Burns continues to make to Scotland's economic and cultural life; understands that business generated during the Burns season includes spending on food and drink, hospitality, accommodation, kilt hire, printing and merchandising; notes that the creative economy is boosted through arts events such as the Big Burns Supper Festival in Dumfries, which is the culmination of Scotland's £390,000 Winter Festivals Programme; understands that year-round Burns-related tourism is on the increase thanks to Burns Scotland partner destinations such as the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum in Alloway, Ellisland Farm near Auldgirth, the Monument Centre in Kilmarnock and Burns House Museum in Mauchline, as well as numerous places around Scotland associated with the poet; notes that Burns the brand helps

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promote Scotland's exports and trade links through Burns suppers around the globe, including through more than 250 member clubs of the Robert Burns World Federation; understands that Burns contributes to the success of Scotland's higher education institutions, including the Centre for Robert Burns Studies at the University of Glasgow, which encourages interest in the Bard through publications, seminar series, conferences, community and performance events, advice to exporters, research grant funding and international students and donor gifts, while providing strong strategic support to the National Burns Collection; understands that the last evaluation of Robert Burns' economic impact on modern Scotland was completed in 2003 for the BBC by the World Bank economist, Lesley Campbell, who estimated that he generated £157 million each year for Scotland, and believes that this figure has grown exponentially since the research was carried out and that celebrations of the Bard's birthday on 25 January will be an enriching experience in every sense of the word.

*S5M-09921 Gillian Martin: Encouraging Cyber-resilience Among Young People—That the Parliament believes that one of the biggest issues for young people in Aberdeenshire and across the country is the pressure to share images of an intimate nature online with their peers; notes the view that an increased awareness of the career consequences, legal implications and bullying and mental health repercussions of such behaviour should be encouraged; acknowledges that recent figures from the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service show the number of children reported to prosecutors for sexual offences has risen by 21% in four years and the number of reported cases involving a child committing a sexual offence against another increased by 34% over the same period; understands that so-called sexting is one of the main reasons for this increase in sexual offences among children, and welcomes campaigns, such as the Young Scot programme, Digi, Aye? Annual uprating of assistance

- (1) The Scottish Ministers are to review each tax year the amount given in respect of each type of assistance provided—
 - (a) under Part 2,
 - (b) by virtue of regulations made under Part 3,

in order to determine whether the assistance has retained its value in relation to the general level of relevant prices.

- (2) Where it appears to the Scottish Ministers that the general level of relevant prices is greater at the end of the period under review than it was at the beginning of that period, the Scottish Ministers must by regulations make provision—
 - (a) which increases the amount payable of each type of assistance by a percentage not less than the percentage by which the general level of relevant prices is greater at the end of the period than it was at the beginning,
 - (b) which states the type of assistance in respect of which an increase has not been made.
- (3) Where subsection (2)(b) applies in relation to a type of assistance, the Scottish Ministers must provide a statement setting out the reason for this.
- (4) Where it appears to the Scottish Ministers that the general level of relevant prices is no greater at the end of the period under review than it was at the beginning of that period, the Scottish Ministers may, if they consider it appropriate having regard to the economic situation in Scotland and any other matters which they consider relevant, make regulations which increase by such a percentage or percentages as they think fit any type of assistance provided for under this Act.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
