*S5M-13945 Liz Smith: Primary 1 Tests—That the Parliament believes that good-quality pupil assessment is an essential component of the drive to raise educational standards in Scotland's schools, but notes the level of concern that has been raised by teachers and other education professionals regarding the introduction and delivery of new testing arrangements for Primary 1 (P1) pupils; considers that this concern questions whether the new P1 tests are in line with the play-based learning philosophy of early years provision in the curriculum for excellence, and, in light of this concern, calls on the Scottish Government to halt the tests in P1 and to reconsider the evidence and the whole approach to evaluating the progress of P1 pupils.

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S5M-13943 James Kelly: USDAW's Time for Better Pay Campaign—That the Parliament notes the Time for Better Pay Campaign, which has been launched by USDAW and seeks to address the issues that many workers face as a result of low pay and short, zero-hour or insecure employment contracts; understands that the union is calling for a minimum wage of £10 per hour for over-18s, a minimum contract of 16-hours per week for everyone who wants it, contracts that are based on people's normal hours of work and an end to the misuse of zero-hour contracts; believes that 470,000 workers in Scotland are understood to rely on unsecured loans to pay essential bills and that over half of these people are struggling with repayments; understands that close to one-in-10 workers earning less than £8.50 an hour have used a food bank, with 19% of workers in Scotland in this wage bracket, and believes that this campaign raises issues that are prevalent for workers in Glasgow and across the country.

*S5M-13920 David Stewart: World Diabetes Day 2018—That the Parliament notes that 14 November 2018 is World Diabetes Day, which is being led by the International Diabetes Federation and its member associations, including Diabetes Scotland; understands that there are over 425 million people worldwide currently living with diabetes; believes that most of these cases are type 2 diabetes, which is considered largely preventable through regular physical activity, a healthy and balanced diet, and the promotion of healthy living environments; understands that

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there are 300,000 people who have been diagnosed with diabetes in Scotland, and notes Diabetes Scotland's call for better emotional, psychological and mental health support for people with diabetes to enable them to successfully manage their condition and reduce the risk of developing life-limiting complications.
