\*<u>S5M-16801</u> Alison Johnstone: Happy 40th Birthday to Child Benefit—That the Parliament celebrates the 40th birthday of child benefit, which was introduced in April 1979; believes that child benefit is one of Scotland's most crucial social security payments, supporting 600,000 families and 900,000 children; welcomes that awareness of this benefit among eligible families is very high, with around 95% take-up; believes that this provides important lessons to the new Scottish social security system regarding how to make eligible families aware of their social security rights; agrees that a child benefit top-up should be used to boost the incomes of poorer families until the Scottish Income Supplement is ready; notes with regret that the actions of UK administrations mean that the value of child benefit has, it understands, fallen by £210 for a one-child family and £350 for a two-child family since 2009-10; welcomes the work of the Resolution Foundation in highlighting the importance of child benefit, and thanks all those who are involved in administering and helping families to access it.

\*<u>S5M-16800</u> Neil Findlay: Scottish Prison Service—That the Parliament notes that an additional £4,000 was given to prison officers as a consequence of their continuing engagement in a change process; welcomes that the PCS union was successful in securing the same payment for more than 700 of its members; is concerned that, while it believes that this settlement demonstrates clearly the power of trade unions in fighting for equality in every workplace in Scotland, there are still workers in lower grades who have not yet, in its view, seen justice done and have still not

received an uplift in their pay to reflect this change; believes that it is not morally correct for a government agency to treat its staff in what it considers this divisive manner, and believes that, in the interest of fairness, this payment should be applied to all band B staff at the earliest opportunity.

\*<u>S5M-16794</u> Kezia Dugdale: The Edinburgh Seven Honoured With their Degrees—That the Parliament notes that the University of Edinburgh is conferring honorary posthumous MBChB degrees on Mary Anderson, Emily Bovell, Matilda Chaplin, Helen Evans, Sophia Jex-Blake, Edith Pechey and Isabel Thorne, who were known as the Edinburgh Seven; acknowledges that, although they were the first female medical students admitted to a UK university when they enrolled in 1869, the seven faced a great deal of resistance from their male counterparts and were ultimately prevented from graduating and qualifying as doctors; notes that their campaign against this treatment gained national attention and many supporters, including Charles Darwin, and led to legislation in 1876 to ensure that women could study and graduate in medicine at university; welcomes this news that, after 150 years, the seven are finally being awarded their degrees and are being recognised for helping to break down barriers, and considers them pioneers for the feminists who followed them in demanding equality and women's rightful, equal, place in the world.

\*<u>S5M-16793</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: MEAction Scotland and the Draft Neurological Action Plan—That the Parliament understands that the draft neurological action plan sets out 17 commitments that aim to offer people living with neurological conditions access to improved care and support; believes that this represents potential progress for people affected by life-changing conditions; applauds the aim to introduce the first such national plan on neurological care; understands however that ME, or chronic fatigue syndrome, has previously been denigrated by neurological services and that it is not included in the two key pieces of work, on the prevalence and the mapping of neurological services, that were commissioned to underpin the plan; notes that MEAction Scotland, which is part of an international network of people that works towards health equality for people with ME, has expressed regret that it believes that the plan does not address the current situation relating to the support and treatment of people with the condition, and hopes that the final plan will rectify this to help ensure that it will be able to develop effective services for all people with neurological illnesses, including ME.

\*<u>S5M-16792</u> Alison Johnstone: Recognition for the Edinburgh Seven—That the Parliament welcomes the announcement that Sophia Jex-Blake, Isabel Thorne, Edith Pechey, Matilda Chaplin, Helen Evans, Mary Anderson, and Emily Bovell, who were known as the Edinburgh Seven, are to be awarded posthumous honorary degrees by the University of Edinburgh on 6 July 2019; understands that, when they began studying medicine in 1869, they were the first group of matriculated undergraduate female students at any British university; believes that they endured verbal and physical harassment and were prevented from graduating and qualifying as doctors; considers however that their efforts helped put the right of women to receive a university education on the national agenda; understands that their campaign gained support from key figures of the day, including Charles Darwin, and that their efforts led directly to the introduction of the Medical Act 1876, which gave permissive power to the medical examining bodies in the UK

to admit women to their qualifying examinations, and congratulates those involved with working to give the seven what it sees as this richly-deserved accolade.

# **Members' Bills Proposals**

#### **Proposals for Members' Bills**

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
