*<u>S5M-20183</u> Angela Constance: West Lothian Good Causes Benefit from Co-op Customer Donations—That the Parliament congratulates West Lothian Action for Children, Livingston Athletic Club and Team Jak, which are all good causes based in West Lothian, on receiving support from the Big Co-op Payout; understands the Co-op is delivering £17 million to over 4,000 community groups thanks to customers using their membership cards to donate 1% of each transaction to a community cause; acknowledges that Action for Children was awarded £4,513, Team Jak, £4,641, and Livingston Athletic Club, £4,234; believes that this support will be of great benefit to children, young people and families in Livingston and throughout West Lothian, and wishes each of the groups every success.

*<u>S5M-20182</u> Brian Whittle: Asda Kilmarnock Supports Local Charities—That the Parliament congratulates the staff of Asda Kilmarnock on their efforts to support the local charity, Cash for Kids, by taking part in a "Back to School" event, which raised £671 for the charity; further congratulates the customers of Asda Kilmarnock who, through the Asda Foundation's Green Token Giving programme, awarded £500 to Ayrshire Cancer Support and £200 each to SEA and No-one Dies Alone Ayrshire; commends Asda's staff and customers and the Asda Foundation for their commitment to supporting local charities, and thanks them for their contributions.

*<u>S5M-20181</u> John Finnie: Poor Industrial Relations and Safety on Network Rail in Scotland —That the Parliament is deeply concerned at reports that there are at least 219 unfilled track maintenance vacancies across Network Rail in Scotland; understands that this represents a vacancy gap of 10%; believes with alarm that this raises safety concerns and has also contributed to a management-driven culture of "job and knock", which seeks to cram and rush essential track safety maintenance work to meet performance targets; understands that this approach is leading to inconsistent management practices, which are resulting in workers being treated differently in different areas, including being subject to unfair dismissals, particularly in the Inverness area; is dismayed at reports that repeated warnings and representations by the RMT have been ignored by management and that what it sees as this toxic combination of unfilled vacancies and unfair management has now led to a dispute situation, and calls on Scotland's Railway Managing Director to intervene and meet the RMT's concerns and resolve this dispute and its root causes.

*<u>S5M-20180</u> John Mason: Falling Alcohol Death Rate—That the Parliament welcomes recent Office for National Statistics figures, which it understands show that the alcohol death rate in Scotland has fallen over the last decade; believes that Scotland is the only UK nation to witness a falling rate this century, with a 25% drop in the rate for males and a 10% drop in the rate for females; recognises what it sees as the immediate impact of alcohol minimum pricing, which it understands saw alcohol consumption in Scotland fall by 3% in its first year, and considers that, while the figure for Scotland is still twice that of England, these improvements are hugely important for the health and wellbeing of the country.

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
