*S5M-17336 Jackie Baillie: 100% Price Increase on Community Alarms—That the Parliament regrets West Dunbartonshire Health and Social Care Partnership's decision to implement a 100% price increase in the cost of community alarms; considers that the users of these alarms are vulnerable residents, many of whom are older people and live in sheltered housing; further considers that such a significant increase is unaffordable for people on low and fixed incomes; understands that some 200 people have already cancelled the service and believes that this runs contrary to the policy of helping people to remain in their own homes, and calls on West Dunbartonshire Health and Care Partnership to urgently review the increased charge.

*S5M-17335 Michelle Ballantyne: Charles Lapworth Plaque—That the Parliament notes that a plaque has been unveiled in Galashiels to recognise the influential geologist, Charles Lapworth, who lived in the town for 11 years; understands that Lapworth, who stayed in Galashiels from 1864 to 1875, is best known for his faunal analysis of rock beds from the Silurian period, and made innovative use of index fossils, which are used to identify geological periods; acknowledges that the plaque has been affixed to the Old Episcopal School where Lapworth worked as headmaster, and was unveiled by the former president of the Edinburgh Geological Society, Professor Stuart Monro; thanks the Galashiels residents, Malcolm Lindsay and David Adamson,

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for applying for the plaque as part of Historic Environment Scotland's Commemorative Plaque Scheme, and hopes that the plaque will inspire Galashiels residents to learn more about Lapworth and his valuable geological work.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
