Other new and altered motions and amendments

***[S5M-22353](#) Kenneth Gibson: Pride Youth Games, Largs 2021**—That the Parliament notes that the Pride Youth Games, one of the biggest LGBT+ events in the UK, is due to be staged at Inverclyde Sports Centre in Largs from 6 to 8 August 2021; understands that this event will be organised by LEAP Sports Scotland and involve a residential weekend of activities where young people come together and experience sport and activities in a fun, safe and inclusive environment; recognises that young people will attend from LGBT+ youth groups throughout the UK and that many of them face hardships such as family rejection, homelessness, mental health issues and experiences of anti-LGBT+ bullying and violence; considers that this event will bring people together at a time when they are vulnerable to social isolation and exclusion, and when they are developing confidence in their own identities following often hostile school experiences of sport and physical education; appreciates that Inverclyde Sports Centre has hosted major sporting spectacles over the years, including Commonwealth Fencing, Scottish Judo Championships and the 2014 Commonwealth Games Baton, as well as Scottish Premiership football sides Hamilton and Kilmarnock, and that this latest event will bring a major economic spin-off to the local area; commends LEAP Sports Scotland for the work that it does for greater inclusion for LGBT+ people, and wishes LEAP Sports Scotland and Inverclyde Sports Centre all the best for the event.

***[S5M-22352](#) Maurice Corry: Neilston War Memorial Association**—That the Parliament recognises the importance of promoting the preservation and support of Scotland's war memorial associations, such as the Neilston War Memorial Association, a registered charity based in East Renfrewshire; appreciates that in 2015 this association raised over £80,000 to build the civic memorial as a focal point of remembrance for those fallen in war, the majority of which was funded from within the local community; understands the breadth of research undertaken by the group in establishing the histories of local men who lost their lives in service for their country; notes with sincere regret the vandalism and desecration of the village memorial, which occurred three times in one year and has resulted in thousands of pounds in repair; recognises the enduring hurt and offence this has caused, especially to those whose loved ones the memorial seeks to honour as a place of peace and remembrance, and hopes that the efforts of every war association will not be taken for granted, for the sake of honouring men and women who gave the ultimate sacrifice.

***[S5M-22351](#) Roseanna Cunningham: Greenhouse Gas Emissions Trading Scheme Order 2020 [draft]**—That the Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform Committee recommends that the Greenhouse Gas Emissions Trading Scheme Order 2020 [draft] be approved.

***[S5M-22350](#) Mary Fee: Tesco Renfrew Junior and Junior Plus Nappies**—That the Parliament recognises that Tesco Renfrew now supplies own brand junior and junior plus nappies; notes that these are larger nappies and incontinence pads for older children; understands that these are priced at £4.50 per pack of 20 meaning that they are the only option on the market that do not have a disability price tag; recognises that, before this change was made, parents of disabled children who need larger nappies were forced to purchase these online and wait for them to arrive; understands that this product introduction was made due to the tireless work of the Scottish campaigner, Laura Rutherford, who collected over 18,000 signatures on her online petition calling for a UK supermarket supplier of these products, in addition to the continence service, which she then shared with the supermarket chain, and appreciates that Tesco Renfrew can now provide assistance to any families with disabled children with an affordable product that meets their needs.

***[S5M-22349](#) Maureen Watt: Cove Rangers, League Two Champions**—That the Parliament congratulates Cove Rangers on being crowned SPFL League Two champions and gaining promotion to League One; recognises that this follows the team's promotion from the Highland League in season 2018-19, resulting in a second consecutive promotion in the club's first season in senior league football; commends the board, management, players and supporters, and wishes the club the best of luck for the upcoming season.

***[S5M-22347](#) Elaine Smith: Rab Bannon, Unsung Hero**—That the Parliament notes with sadness the passing of the Coatbridge boxing trainer, Rab Bannon, who positively shaped the lives and careers of all those involved with the Barn Boxing Club; acknowledges that he was awarded the BBC Get Inspired Unsung Hero Award in 2015 for his work developing numerous amateur, national and world boxing champions; recognises the esteem and respect with which he was held by his local community, and sends its condolences to his family and friends.

***[S5M-22346](#) Jackie Baillie: Jagtar Singh Johal Detained for 1,000 Days on 30 July 2020—**

That the Parliament understands that Jagtar Singh Johal will have been detained for 1,000 days on 30 July 2020 by Indian authorities for a crime that he strongly denies he committed; notes with concern reports that Jagtar, who is from Dumbarton, has allegedly been subjected to extreme police torture, including electric shocks and body separation techniques, during his imprisonment by police in the Punjab region; understands that little progress has been made with his trial since Jagtar was arrested on 4 November 2017 and that the 47th trial hearing was postponed without any proceedings; is concerned by what it considers the inappropriate trial by media in India that it believes will compromise any chance of a fair trial; commends the peaceful protests held by Sikh communities across Scotland calling on the UK Government to take immediate action to support Jagtar and his family, ensuring they receive the same treatment and support as any other detained British citizen, and calls on the First Minister to agree to meet with Jagtar's family to consider how the Scottish Government can help.

***[S5M-22345](#) Alison Johnstone: Accessibility and Artists of Colour—**That the Parliament considers that more must be done to highlight the artistic works of people of colour, and that it has an important part to play in this endeavour; believes that representation within the cultural sphere should reflect the diversity of Scotland; understands that there are barriers to career progression within the arts that disproportionately affect minority ethnic groups; believes that artists of colour should be made more visible within the Scottish culture sector and within Scottish history and education, and calls on the Scottish Government to set out how it plans to engage Scotland's minority ethnic communities in the culture sector and promote the artistic works of people of colour within Scottish culture and education.

***[S5M-22344](#) Alex Cole-Hamilton: Non-Melanoma Skin Cancer Report—**That the Parliament welcomes the publication of the report, *State of the Nation: Non-Melanoma Skin Cancer*, which aims to raise awareness of what it understands is the most common cancer in the UK; support the report's aims to both increase awareness and improve the quality of care provided; acknowledges that the report includes contributions from key opinion leaders in dermatology and patient advocates, and the real-life experiences of people living with the condition, and supports the importance of skin cancer prevention.

***[S5M-22343](#) Keith Brown: Openreach Unveils its Largest Hard-to-reach Full Fibre Build—**That the Parliament welcomes Openreach's announcement of plans to make ultra-reliable and gigabit-capable full fibre broadband available to thousands of homes and businesses in harder-to-reach communities across Scotland; understands that Alloa, Sauchie, Clackmannan, Menstrie and Alva are among 60 small and rural towns and villages across Scotland to be upgraded; notes that access to faster broadband speeds will be crucial to communities' ability to recover post COVID-19; recognises that this is part of a £12 billion investment to build full fibre infrastructure for 20 million premises throughout the UK by the mid to late 2020s, and believes that this will deliver significant economic, social and environmental benefits for rural and urban communities.

***S5M-22340 Sandra White: Glasgow's Golden Generation Provides Community Support—**

That the Parliament recognises the support offered by the Glasgow Kelvin constituency-based Glasgow's Golden Generation (GGG) on its incredible efforts to support members of the community throughout the COVID-19 pandemic; understands that it has provided 6,500 parcels to over 500 older people as well as making 8,500 welfare and befriending telephone calls to people who are housebound, shielding or vulnerable; notes that each parcel contains essentials, including bread, milk, tinned goods, cleaning products and face coverings, which are produced by Angelic Threads; understands that GGG has expanded its service to include a weekly newsletter with puzzles and old photographs of Glasgow, as well as online non-gambling bingo, and commends everyone involved in this initiative, which has been a lifeline for many older and vulnerable adults.

***S5M-22339 Sandra White: Glasgow Central Station —**That the Parliament congratulates the team at Glasgow Central Station for performing very strongly in the National Rail Passenger Survey, with passengers' satisfaction up by 2.5% to an overall score of 90%; recognises the work done by Network Rail, ScotRail, Avanti West Coast, TransPennine Express, Cross Country, LNER and Caledonian Sleeper frontline staff to support passengers at the station during the COVID-19 pandemic while maintaining extremely high standards of passenger satisfaction; acknowledges how well the adopted safety measures have worked, such as safe distance floor vinyl, sanitising units at entrances and concourse areas and the distribution of face coverings to passengers, and acknowledges the contribution of Scotland's railway during the pandemic in keeping Scotland moving.

***S5M-22337 Neil Findlay: The Winchburgh Wombles Keep Winchburgh Tidy—**That the Parliament commends the Winchburgh Community Growing Group for launching a new initiative to keep the village looking its best; understands that the Winchburgh Wombles have been formed by a group of local volunteers and will meet every week to pick litter throughout the village; notes that the initiative has the support of Winchburgh and Holy Family primary schools, and believes that it is an excellent initiative to keep the village clean.

***S5M-22336 Gordon MacDonald: Commending Community One Stop Shop Volunteers During the COVID-19 Pandemic—**That the Parliament commends the volunteers at the Community One Stop Shop (COSS) in Broomhouse, Edinburgh, for contributing nearly 200 hours

of voluntary work in June 2020; understands that COSS is a charity that offers advice services, one-to-one employability support, ancillary services and a self-referral food bank; believes that, like many other key workers during the pandemic, all of the volunteers who work with the charity are going above and beyond to help others in need; notes that COSS has been busier than usual over the last five months; echoes the recent statement of Carol Swan, Project Manager at COSS, who thanked "the real heroes of the project – the amazing staff and volunteers", and recognises the crucial role that COSS plays in alleviating the effects of poverty in the area and supporting many people through this time of crisis.
