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S5M-19754 Tom Arthur: Scotland's War Memorials—That the Parliament recognises the importance of protecting and conserving Scotland's war memorials, and highlights the positive impact that war memorial associations have in communities across the country; understands that, until 2015, the East Renfrewshire village of Neilston was one of the few communities in Scotland that did not have a unified memorial to acknowledge those who gave their lives in the service of their country; recognises the crucial role played by Matt Drennan, Secretary of the Neilston War Memorial Association, in campaigning for a memorial and raising the £85,000 required for its construction and who now dedicates significant time to the upkeep of the site; notes that Matt was instrumental in obtaining a Book of Dedication for the fallen, which now sits in Neilston Library, and that he was part of the small team that spent hundreds of hours researching the names and historical backgrounds of men from Neilston who lost their lives in the wars; further notes that Matt also plays a significant role in the organisation and running of Neilston's annual Remembrance Service Parade; recognises the efforts of all those who support war memorials around the Renfrewshire South constituency, and all those involved in war memorial associations across Scotland, and thanks them for their selfless work.

*<u>S5M-21040</u> Clare Adamson: Electrical Fire Safety Fund—That the Parliament recognises that Electrical Safety First's Electrical Fire Safety Fund is now open for applications; understands that the Fund, which opens until 6 March 2020, aims to provide direct benefit to local communities through project-based partnerships that will deliver outcomes that, in the long term, will contribute to a reduction in the number of electrically-related accidental fires and associated injuries in UK homes; acknowledges that applicants are invited to apply for up to £5,000 per organisation; notes that grants are available to consumer safety organisations in the community, such as fire and rescue services, trading standards teams and charities, to deliver effective fire prevention measures at local level aimed at tackling the causes of fires in homes started by electricity, and recognises that, this year, preference will be given to projects that seek to address the risks of fires associated with electrical products and appliances.

*<u>S5M-21039</u> Angela Constance: Rabs Bar in Livingston Raises £1,900 for the Larder Charity in 12-hour Darts Marathon—That the Parliament congratulates Rabs Bar, which is based in Livingston, on raising £1,900 for the Larder West Lothian by a holding a 12-hour darts marathon; understands that the Rabs Bar darts team managed to raise the funds through a combination of sponsors, raffles and donations over the course of 12 hours; recognises that Angela Moohan,

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founder and CEO of the Larder welcomed the fundraising efforts, adding that "the money raised will help the Larder to support more of its students and help them take the next step in their journey", and thanks Rabs Bar for organising the event.

*S5M-21038 Kenneth Gibson: Katyn Remembered—That the Parliament notes that 5 March 2020 marks the 80th anniversary of the order being given for the Katyn massacre, involving the mass executions of 21,857 Polish officers and intelligentsia carried out by the Soviet People's Commissariat for Internal Affairs (NKVD) in April and May 1940; understands that the massacre was initiated by NKVD chief Lavrentiv Beria's proposal to execute all captive members of the Polish officer corps and approved by the Soviet Politburo led by Joseph Stalin; recognises that the victims included pilots, government representatives, academics and 300 doctors; further recognises that, of those killed, about 8,000 were officers imprisoned during the 1939 Soviet invasion of Poland, another 6,000 were police officers and that the murdered included ethnic Poles, Ukrainians, Belarusians and Jews such as the Chief Rabbi of the Polish Army, Baruch Steinberg; notes that, though the killings also occurred in Kalinin and Kharkiv prisons and elsewhere, the massacre is named after the Katyn Forest, where mass graves were first discovered by Nazi Germany in 1943, after which the USSR claimed the Nazis had killed the victims and continued to deny responsibility for the massacres until 1990, when it officially acknowledged and condemned the killings by the NKVD, as well as the subsequent cover-up by the Soviet government; acknowledges that the Katyn Massacre left a deep scar in Polish-Soviet relations during the remainder of the Second World War and subsequently, and that it was not until November 2010 that the State Duma (the lower house of the Russian Federal Assembly) officially declared that Joseph Stalin and other Soviet leaders were responsible for ordering the execution of the Polish officers at Katyn, and believes that these events, the lives tragically lost and impact on the Polish people should be remembered for generations to come.

*<u>S5M-21037</u> Annabelle Ewing: Aileen Todd of Crossgates, Defibrillator Fundraiser—That the Parliament notes the impressive fundraising efforts of Aileen Todd from Crossgates, which have saw her raise £2,200 toward purchasing a defibrillator for the community; understands that Aileen's fundraising drive was sparked by her experiencing a heart attack in December 2018; commends her on these efforts on behalf of the community, which it believes will help to save lives, and wishes Aileen every success for the future.

*S5M-21036 Gillian Martin: World Wildlife Day—That the Parliament celebrates World Wildlife Day, which will be marked on 3 March 2020; considers that this year's theme, Sustaining all Life on Earth, is vital for raising awareness of wild animal and plant species as key components of the world's biodiversity; considers that there is a global biodiversity crisis and that this is inextricably linked to the climate emergency; notes with concern the recent report from the UN Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services, which outlines the forces that affect biodiversity and ecosystems and can encourage an urgent global response from governments around the world in making transformative changes to the way nature is protected and restored while there is still time; further notes the recent report, *State of Nature Scotland Report 2019*, by government agencies and leading wildlife organisations, which calls attention to how Scotland's biodiversity is suffering from the impact of pressures such as habitat fragmentation, climate change and invasive non-native species, which it understands has resulted in a 49% decrease in Scottish species; acknowledges the work done by community groups across Scotland, such as the River Ythan Trust, to tackle invasive non-native species, and recognises

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what it considers the importance of Scottish Environment LINK's Species Champions initiative, which has 104 MSPs signed up to promote and protect Scotland's wildlife through raising awareness within Scotland's political community while shaping policy to promote and secure biodiversity. **R**

*<u>S5M-21035</u> Colin Beattie: Funding for Lothians Animal Rescue and Rehoming Centre— That the Parliament congratulates the Scottish SPCA Edinburgh and Lothians Animal Rescue and Rehoming Centre on receiving a £1,000 award from the Asda Green Token Giving programme; recognises that Asda customers were given the chance to vote for their favourite charity and chose the centre; acknowledges the wonderful work that this project does to protect animal welfare, rehabilitate animals and find them new homes, and commends everyone involved for their efforts to support the important bond between humans and animals and to eradicate animal abuse and violence.

*<u>S5M-21034</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: Cancer Research Report on Smoking Prevalence—That the Parliament recognises the recent report published by Cancer Research UK on smoking prevalence projections across the UK, which it understands finds that if current trends continue, the Scottish Government will miss its target to see a tobacco-free generation by 2034, and will not meet this until after 2050; notes that Cancer Research UK projections suggest that Scotland's least deprived quintile could achieve the Scottish Government's tobacco-free generation target in 2034, but the most deprived areas will have not reached a smoking rate below 10% by 2050, and considers that urgent action is needed by the Scottish Government to ensure that smoking cessation rates improve, including evaluating the 2018 Tobacco Control Action Plan, ensuring the delivery across each NHS board of structured programmes of recording of smoking status, providing prompt provision of specialist smoking cessation and ongoing support across all healthcare settings and increasing funding for national mass media campaigns to reduce uptake and encourage smokers to quit.

*<u>S5M-21033</u> Michelle Ballantyne: William Wallace Statue Conservation—That the Parliament notes that essential conservation work is set to begin on the iconic William Wallace statue at Bemersyde; understands that the statue, which was erected in 1814 and overlooks the River Tweed, is Scotland's oldest monument to Wallace and is owned by the William Wallace Trust (WWT); acknowledges that the last conservation work was conducted in 1991, when £20,000 was raised to restore it to its original state; notes that the first phase of the new essential maintenance will begin in April 2020 and that the second phase will focus on restoration of the statue's claymore; commends the WWT's trustees for their hard work in funding this project, and wishes them all the best for the future.
