*S5M-22320 Alexander Stewart: National Road Victim Month 2020—That the Parliament acknowledges that August is National Road Victim Month 2020; notes that this is organised annually by RoadPeace, which is the national charity for road crash victims in the UK; recognises that it aims to remember people who have been killed or injured on the country's road sand that August was designated as the awareness month as Princess Diana was killed on 31 August 1997; recognises that RoadPeace provides people affected by road crashes with emotional and practical support and advocacy and organises awareness events, fundraising activities and a helpline that provides practical support; acknowledges the excellent local work carried out by organisations such as Safe Drive, Stay Alive, which operates many road safety activities, including interactive stage events that are aimed at raising awareness of car and driving safety among young people, and sends its best wishes to everyone involved with National Road Victim Month.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S5M-22332 Miles Briggs: Action Needed to Improve Bladder Cancer Outcomes—That the Parliament notes that the Quality Performance Indicator Programme shows that 4,246 people were diagnosed with bladder cancer between 2014 and 2017, 30% of whom were female; understands that the condition was not listed as one of those to be focused on in the previous Detect Cancer Early Programme; is concerned that bladder cancer numbers in Scotland are disproportionately high relative to the rest of the UK and that late diagnosis, especially in women, leads to poorer outcomes; understands that there have been no significant improvements in survival rates in the last 10 years and that research funding is low compared to other cancers; notes calls for a new national campaign to raise awareness among medical professionals, workplaces and the general public of the condition and its symptoms and main risk factors in order to boost early detection and treatment and to tackle the perception that this cancer is only found in older people; commends the website fightbladdercancer.co.uk, which it hopes many people will access for information, and urges the Scottish Government to work closely with Fight

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Bladder Cancer UK and the soon-to-be-formed Fight Bladder Cancer (Scotland), and world-class urologists and bladder cancer experts such as Param Mariappan of NHS Lothian, people living with the condition and all other stakeholders to increase awareness of bladder cancer and ensure that positive progress is made in increasing early diagnosis and improving outcomes and survival rates.

*S5M-22331 Alexander Stewart: Increase in Clackmannanshire Rail Services—That the Parliament notes that, after much campaigning, ScotRail customers in Clackmannanshire will have access to an increased number of services from 3 August 2020, with an additional 16 trains between Alloa and Glasgow, bringing the timetable to a half-hourly service for most of the day ahead of an all-day half-hourly service being introduced in 2021, and increased peak-hour services between Stirling and Glasgow, and welcomes the introduction of these new services.

*S5M-22330 Keith Brown: National Graduates Day—That the Parliament notes that 30 July 2020 is National Graduates Day, which is a day to celebrate graduate success; believes that this year's celebrations must also recognise the extraordinary resilience and academic achievements of university graduates in the face of COVID-19; commends graduates from the University of Stirling, and across Scotland for their hard work and dedication throughout their studies; highlights the immeasurable contribution that many students have made to the national effort against the COVID-19 pandemic, by helping frontline NHS services, volunteering in their communities and so much more; recognises the wider contributions graduates make to communities, society and economy, both during their studies and after graduation; notes the work of Scotland's further education institutions in continuing to provide remote learning and holding examinations throughout the pandemic, enabling students to complete their degrees, and wishes all of this year's graduates the best of luck in their future steps.

*S5M-22329 Gordon MacDonald: Saughton Park, the UK's First Fully Eco-powered Greenspace—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Saughton Park in Edinburgh has become the UK's first fully eco-powered greenspace; understands that carbon dioxide emissions from the park are expected to be reduced by the equivalent of 90 tonnes thanks to the installation of a micro hydro-electric scheme and two ground-source heat pumps; appreciates that the electricity generated from the micro-hydro technology on the Water of Leith will be used in the park and to power the pumps, which will warm the park's buildings, café and glasshouse; believes that the equipment will save Edinburgh Council £18,000 a year in energy costs, with the savings to be re-invested in social and education facilities in the park; recognises that the project received nearly £500,000 from ScottishPower Energy Networks' £20 million Green Economy Fund and £180,000 from the Scottish Government's Energy Efficient Scotland programme, and believes that it will provide cleaner air for people in Edinburgh and a blueprint that can be used for other greenspaces around the world.

*S5M-22328 Miles Briggs: The Don't Trash our Future Campaign—That the Parliament commends Edinburgh Live on its campaign, Don't Trash our Future, in collaboration with Clean Up Britain; condemns the reported increase in littering across Edinburgh since the easing of lockdown restrictions; supports actions to reduce littering, which it considers is unacceptable, and believes that laws to prevent littering should be enforced.

*S5M-22327 Mary Fee: World Day Against Trafficking in Humans—That the Parliament recognises that 30 July 2020 is World Day Against Trafficking in Persons, which is an annual event that seeks to raise awareness of human trafficking; notes that the focus for this year is on the first responders to trafficking who work in a variety of sectors; understands that they work to identify, support, counsel and seek justice for victims and to challenge impunity of the traffickers; acknowledges that their roles have become more essential than ever during the COVID-19 crisis, where their ability to work has been made even more difficult by restrictions put in place; recognises that trafficking is one of the worst global human rights violations; notes that people are trafficked for a number of different reasons, including sexual exploitation, forced labour and slavery; understands that women and girls make up 72% of all victims; realises that the share of people trafficked in their own country has doubled to 58% in recent years; commends the work of all first responders in tackling human trafficking, and endeavours to continue to do all it can to promote and protect the rights of people who have become victims of trafficking and to raise more awareness of victims..

*S5M-22326 John Mason: Wealth Tax Reform—That the Parliament notes the recent Fraser of Allander publication, Does the case for reform of wealth taxation outweigh the practical challenges?; understands that wealth inequality in Scotland is significant and rising, with COVID-19 likely to contribute further; believes that the current means of wealth taxation are not reducing the inequality gap; notes that, at present in the UK, wealth taxes come in two forms, wealth transfer taxes and capital gains tax; believes however that both of these are set up with many reliefs, allowances and exceptions hindering their effectiveness; recognises the publication's discussion of a tax on net wealth, which, although posing practicable difficulties, is not insurmountable, and believes that, when Scotland gains greater financial responsibilities, there should be a focus on a more equitable distribution of wealth in the country and that wealth tax reform, and perhaps a serious discussion around a net wealth tax, would help to achieve this.

*S5M-22325 Rona Mackay: Kirkintilloch Rotary Club Receives Award—That the Parliament congratulates members of Kirkintilloch Rotary Club on it being awarded Club of the Year in the Rotary International's West of Scotland Awards 2020; acknowledges that the club was also awarded President of the Year, Secretary of the Year and Assistant Governor of the Year, in addition to qualifying for the prestigious Rotary International Presidential Citation; understands that, since the start of COVID-19 restrictions, members have been holding their meetings remotely, have maintained high turnout and gained 10 new members; notes that the members have donated thousands of pounds to support the G66 Covid Response Team; understands that, prior to the pandemic, members held multiple events in partnership with Rotary Clubs across East Dunbartonshire and Oban to fund 30,000 polio immunisations for children around the world, and commends the members on their tremendous generosity and efforts to help their community and beyond, and for this well-deserved recognition.

*<u>S5M-22324</u> lain Gray: Protecting Jobs, Pay and Conditions at Heriot-Watt University—That the Parliament notes with concern the reported potential job losses and changes to staff terms and conditions at Heriot-Watt University as a consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic; understands

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that the University and Colleges Union branch is working to protect jobs, pay and conditions for all staff after being informed of the university's decision to reportedly seek £13 million in savings, with £11.6 million to be reduced from staff costs and an additional £9 million from job cuts; further understands that all staff pay has been frozen, which it considers is particularly damaging to female staff's wages due to the gender and equal pay gap at Heriot-Watt University; is concerned at reports that between 70 and 90 jobs, around 5% of the workforce, face redundancy, and calls on the university to ensure that there are no compulsory redundancies and use any available income to close gender and equal pay gaps.

*S5M-22323 Kenneth Gibson: Poland Must Not Withdraw from the Istanbul Convention— That the Parliament notes with concern the Polish Government's expressed plan to withdraw the country from the Council of Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence, which is also known as the Istanbul Convention; recognises that the Convention, which was ratified in 2015, is based on the understanding that violence against women is a form of gender-based violence committed against women because they are women and obligates member states to fully address it in all its forms and to take measures to prevent it, protect its victims and prosecute the perpetrators; is aware that, if Poland was to withdraw, this could effectively legalise violence against women, including marital rape and female genital mutilation; believes that this move is part of an extremely worrying agenda promoting the regression of women's and gay rights in Poland under its recently re-elected PiS-administration, which, it understands, campaigned on a platform of anti-gay policies, with the Justice minister, Zbigniew Ziobro, previously calling the Convention "an invention, a feminist creation aimed at justifying gay ideology"; acknowledges the impact it believes that Poland's withdrawal could have on the lives and safety of women, and urges President Andrzej Duda, the Justice minister and the Polish Government, to reconsider the decision to withdraw from the Istanbul Convention.

*S5M-22322 Emma Harper: Drax Group Provides Chromebooks to Young People Across Dumfries and Galloway—That the Parliament congratulates Drax Group, a Scottish and international energy company that focuses on delivering a zero carbon, lower cost energy future for its consumers and clients, on donating £250,000 worth of Chromebooks to school-aged young people across Dumfries and Galloway and Scotland during the COVID-19 pandemic; notes that these Chromebooks, along with pre-paid internet dongles, have better enabled learning from home for young people who did not have access to the equipment; understands that, across Dumfries and Galloway, Drax delivered 182 Chromebooks with dongles to Gelston, Castle Douglas, Kirkcudbright, Dalry and Kells, Crossmichael and Heathhall primary schools, as well as to Dumfries and Galloway College; notes that the Chromebooks and dongles have enabled young people to learn in a home setting and that the laptops have also relieved stress for parents and carers who were struggling with the cost of purchasing the equipment; thanks Drax Group for this important community work, and wishes the company well for the future.
