Scottish Law Commission Bills

Further to the Delegated Powers and Law Reform Committee's 67th Report of Session 5 (SP Paper 858), the Presiding Officer's Determination to identify a Scottish Law Commission Bill as defined in Rule 9.17A of Standing Orders has been updated for Session 6 as follows— As well as implementing all or part of a report of the Scottish Law Commission, the definition of a Scottish Law Commission Bill includes criteria to be determined by the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer has determined under Rule 9.17A.1(b) that a Scottish Law Commission Bill is a Bill within the legislative competence of the Scottish Parliament the primary purpose of which is to- (a) simplify, modernise or improve the law to- (i) ensure it is fit for purpose, (ii) respond to developments, or address deficiencies, in the common law, or (iii) respond to other developments in the law (b) make provision which is not likely to generate substantial controversy among stakeholders. Consideration should also be given by the Parliamentary Bureau to whether there are any wider legislative proposals expected within two years beginning with the date of introduction of the Bill (or by the end of the same session if sooner), which relate closely to the same particular aspect of law as the Bill. Where further legislation is expected, regard should be had to whether scrutiny of the overall proposed law change would be aided by both pieces of legislation being referred to the committee that would be designated lead committee were Rule 6.11.1(q) not to apply.

*S5M-24454 Emma Harper: Well Done to Stranraer Can Do Participants — That the Parliament congratulates all of the Dumfries and Galloway College Stranraer campus participants in the Leonard Cheshire Can Do project, which concluded on 23 March 2021 with a virtual awards ceremony at the Stranraer Campus; understands that the Can Do project encourages those aged 16 to 35 with additional support needs to gain new life skills through training and volunteering opportunities in the local community and that the students have been learning about different activities that can support improved mental health and wellbeing from a range of groups in the local area; notes that, due to lockdown, the students have also been taking part, and learning new skills, via virtual means; further understands that the students, working with local businesses like Tammy's Sweet Stems, which is based in Newton Stewart, learned flower arranging skills, and with third sector groups like A Listening Ear in Wigtownshire, worked with people who may be at risk of social isolation and loneliness, particularly during the COVID-19 restrictions; further notes that, as part of the programme, the participants produced and named teddies, with accompanying stories, which were given to members of the local community, and created window displays to help brighten up Stranraer; thanks Leonard Cheshire, The Holywood Trust, The Orcome Trust, Batchwood Community Trust and the National Lottery for funding the programme for the next two years; thanks all staff and students who were involved, and wishes all participants all the very best for the future.

*<u>S5M-24450</u> Elaine Smith: Right to Food —That the Parliament welcomes the proposed Right to Food (Scotland) Bill, which has been backed by 28 MSPs across parties; understands that campaigners, charities, churches, trade unions and members of the public strongly support the principle of enshrining the right to food into law, with over 90% of respondents to the public consultation on the proposed Bill indicating their support; calls for the Scottish Government to act with urgency to give food policy the priority that it deserves, to ensure that no-one goes hungry in Scotland; regrets that food insecurity is one of many important social issues where it considers that the full powers of the Scottish Parliament have not been used to their potential; believes that the Parliament was created with significant optimism, in part due to its potential to stand up for Scotland against what it considers to be social injustices caused by the policies of UK Conservative administrations in the 1980s and 1990s; considers that it has the necessary powers

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to enact a radical agenda for meaningful social change and that this potential is underlined by the passing into law of Members' Bills, such as the Breastfeeding (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Period Products (Free Provision)(Scotland) Act 2021; believes that it has failed to enact legislation that effectively redistributes wealth and power and adequately tackles key issues such as child poverty, homelessness, hunger and challenging austerity; considers that there are a number of systemic causes for what it sees as the failure of the Parliament to address these issues; considers that these include a disproportionate focus on constitutional matters, a committee system that has not held the Scottish Government to account as was originally envisaged and the continued under-representation of women; is of the view that enshrining the right to food would be a radical, progressive action in line with the initial promise of the Parliament, and hopes that future Members will pass such legislation so that the Parliament can finally realise its tremendous potential for creating a fairer, socially just and equal society.

*S5M-24449 Emma Harper: Scottish SPCA Continues Vitally Important Work—That the Parliament believes that the Scottish SPCA demonstrates outstanding performance in the protection of animal welfare across the country, including the rescue and rehabilitation of domestic, wild and farm animals, the provision of educational resources and ongoing advice for people on animal welfare matters; notes that, even during the COVID-19 lockdown restrictions, the Scottish SPCA staff have been out on the frontline to protect animals and enforce animal welfare cases, which has included responding to in excess of 200 reports each day since the beginning of 2020; welcomes the launch of its free online educational resource, its helpline for distance support and its campaigning for the improvement of animal welfare legislation; recognises its exceptional role in the rehabilitation and rehoming of animals at its various centres, including Ayr, particularly during the COVID-19 lockdown measures when the risks of domestic abuse and mistreatment of animals is particularly high; acknowledges its efforts in disruption of the illegal puppy trade through awareness raising campaigns and community dialogue and cross-partner agency working with the Puppy Trafficking Working Group, which includes HMRC, Scottish, English and Northern Irish public and private bodies and animal welfare organisations and government representatives; congratulates the Scottish SPCA on its membership engagement during the pandemic, where it has been helping to prevent social isolation and loneliness; believes that its activities and programmes should be supported, and encourages the next Scottish administration to continue a positive dialogue with the Scottish SPCA on important animal welfare matters.

*S5M-24444 Elaine Smith: Breastfeeding in 21st Century Scotland—That the Parliament considers that, despite the passing of the Breastfeeding etc. (Scotland) Act 2005, which made it an offence to prevent or stop babies being breastfed in public places and made provision to promote breastfeeding, progress with increasing rates of breastfeeding remains slow; notes that, in this regard, the 2020 national statistics report for Public Health Scotland on infant feeding showed the percentage of babies at six to eight weeks being breastfed has risen from 36% 2002-03 to 44% 2019-20; believes that there are still considerable inequalities with babies of older mothers and those living in less deprived areas most likely to be breast fed; recognises that the suspension of face-to-face health visitor care and closure of mother and baby breastfeeding support groups due to the pandemic has made it even more difficult for many new mothers to sustain breastfeeding, and has led to many of them feeling isolated and lacking in factual information; recognises the efforts of teams such as Community Mothers in Lanarkshire, which is working hard, along with NHS Lanarkshire, to provide support services online; regrets that misinformation about COVID-19 and vaccines may have led to some mothers prematurely stopping breastfeeding; notes that the World Health Organization (WHO) states that breastfeeding is the cornerstone of infant and young child survival, nutrition and development and maternal health, and recommends exclusive breastfeeding for the first six months of life, followed by

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continued breastfeeding with appropriate complementary foods for up to two years and beyond; notes that, based on available evidence, WHO recommendations on the initiation and continued breastfeeding of infants and young children also apply to mothers with suspected or confirmed COVID-19; congratulates all the mothers who are breastfeeding their babies during these difficult times, and hopes that the Scottish Government will invest more to prioritise initiatives that encourage, promote and support breastfeeding, with the aim to see rates increase substantially in 21st century Scotland.

Members' Bills Proposals

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.

Final Proposal for a Member's Bill

Jamie Halcro Johnston: Proposed Electricians (Scotland) Bill—Proposal for a Bill to provide for the protection of title and registration of electricians (lodged 24 February 2021).

The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
