*S6M-02639 Bill Kidd: NPT Review Conference and Anniversary of TPNW Entry into Force-That the Parliament recognises that the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) entered into force on 22 January 2021; notes that the first meeting of state parties (1st MSP) will take place in Vienna from 22 to 24 March 2022; further notes that the 1st MSP will determine the rules of procedure for observers and state participators, deadlines for disarmament, verification and removal of nuclear weapons, and victim remediation with an emphasis on the disproportionate impact on indigenous communities and women and girls; recognises that the Review Conference of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) will take place from 4 to 28 January 2022; understands that the UK is a state party to this treaty, and is accordingly bound by Article 6, which is to "pursue negotiations in good faith on effective measures relating to cessation of the nuclear arms race at an early date and to nuclear disarmament"; believes that civil society groups in Scotland, including in the Glasgow Anniesland constituency, consider that the decision to increase the UK's nuclear stockpile creates a higher risk of an accident on Scottish roads, as warheads are transported to and from Faslane, Coulport, and notes the reported calls from civil society groups for the UK Government to uphold its commitment to Article 6 of the NPT and to engage with the 1st MSP on the TPNW in Vienna next year.

*<u>S6M-02689</u> Emma Harper: Praising the Work of the Puppy Trafficking Working Group and Scottish SPCA—That the Parliament supports the continued and ongoing efforts of the Puppy Trafficking Working Group, chaired by the Scottish SPCA, which brings together a wide range of stakeholders to discuss actions across the UK to tackle the illegal puppy trade; notes that the group, established in 2016, includes the Scottish SPCA, the RSPCA, Dog's Trust, the Kennel Club, HMRC, the Scottish Government, DEFRA and DERA officials, Blue Cross, special investigation teams, and local authority trading standards officers, including from Dumfries and Galloway and Highland councils; notes what it sees as the vital importance of the Puppy Motions & Questions Gluasadan agus Ceistean Legislation Reachdas Other Eile

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Trafficking Working Group in allowing a shared platform to discuss cases, actions and examples of best practice in tackling the illegal puppy trade which, it understands, in Scotland, largely operates out of the Port of Cairnryan in Dumfries and Galloway, although dogs can also be brought from other parts of the UK into Scotland; welcomes that, as a result of the group's work, initiatives such as the Scottish SPCA's Assured Puppy Breeder Scheme and the Scottish Government's Say No to Puppy Dealers programme, have been created; encourages everyone to ensure they are aware of the signs of a trafficked puppy, and of the best-practice advice, such as always seeing a pup in its home setting with its mother, before buying; underlines the Scottish SPCA campaign, Keep Me Off Your Xmas List, which states that animals should not be an impulse buy, or purchased as a surprise present at any time, but especially over Christmas; understands that, in previous years, the Scottish SPCA has taken in many animals that were bought as gifts and were then abandoned once the novelty had worn off; considers that buying a pet should not be decided on a whim, that people must understand the commitment required to give the care and attention that a pet needs before buying one, and that pets should always be bought from a reputable source; wishes the Scottish SPCA and all others on the Puppy Trafficking Working Group well for the future, and encourages all to check their website before buying a puppy, saynotopuppydealers.co.uk.
