*S6M-00472 Michael Marra: Reform of Scotland's Education Institutions —The Parliament welcomes the OECD report: Scotland's Curriculum for Excellence - Into the future: further welcomes its recommendations, which highlight issues within the education system that it understands that teachers, young people, educationalists and MSPs have been raising for years; recognises the comments from the OECD regarding the hard work and professionalism of the teaching workforce; acknowledges the view that the implementation of the review must be met with urgency and ambition; notes the view that the inspectorate should be made independent this week, by 27 June 2021; further notes the view that the remaining curriculum function of Education Scotland should be merged with the SQA, as an interim body under new leadership by the middle of July, so that arrangements for 2022 assessments can be made; recognises that the OECD report states that Scotland's uniquely high levels of teacher class contact time is a barrier to progress in education; notes the belief that a new teacher agreement should begin to be negotiated between the Scottish Government, COSLA and teaching unions immediately, and that any new agreement should be robustly resourced; further acknowledges the belief that the Chairs of the new independent inspectorate and curriculum and assessment agency should be appointed by the Parliament: further notes the belief that such reforms can further unlock the potential of schools in the North East and across Scotland, and notes calls on the Scottish Government to take the reforms forward.

that, in some areas, up to a third of consultant posts are vacant; believes that workforce shortages and vacancies lead to unacceptable caseloads, long waiting times and delays in care for the millions of people with conditions such as arthritis; considers that rheumatology career pathways must address the reported current shortages; believes that enhancing and upskilling the current multi-disciplinary teams' roles would allow staff to extend their scope of practice in departments and meet increasing service demands; commends the contribution of rheumatology departments; believes that they are working hard to bring down diagnostic backlogs, and calls on the Scottish Government to invest in the current rheumatology workforce numbers and boost training places to meet forecast demand.

*S6M-00489 Sue Webber: Kelly Given, NHS Lothian Key Worker Recognised for her Work Challenging Stigma Around Disability—That the Parliament congratulates Kelly Given on being named in the Shaw Trust's 2021 Disability Power 100 list for 2021, which is an annual celebration of those who are considered the 100 most influential disabled people in the UK, working to break the stigma around disability; acknowledges that Kelly is currently working with NHS Lothian Disability Network to improve access to diagnosis and early intervention for girls autism, and wishes her continued success.

*S6M-00487 Monica Lennon: Lanarkshire Musician, Matt Eroteme Donates Proceeds of New Single to Mental Health Charities—That the Parliament congratulates the East-Kilbride based musician, Matt Eroteme, on the release of his single, *Lean on You*, which is a collaboration with his sister Colette Cowan, who features on the track, and their mother, Carol Bryan, who painted the coverwork; commends Matt for raising awareness of mental health and suicide prevention through his songs and contributions to the online mental health platform, Thrive Thru; notes that the proceeds of the single will be donated directly to mental health charities, alongside a fundraising page for the suicide prevention charity, Samaritans; recognises that Matt is committed to tackling mental health stigma through his music and wishes him well with the single and his future endeavours.

*S6M-00486 Alex Cole-Hamilton: Fox Covert Pupils Win Abundant Borders Award—That the Parliament congratulates the nine pupils from Fox Covert Primary School, who have been awarded a recognised horticultural award from Abundant Borders; notes that Abundant Borders is a horticultural training body, based in the Scottish Borders; commends the pupils for committing themselves to weekly gardening throughout the length of the COVID-19 lockdown and beyond; acknowledges that the children grew a number of different vegetables and edible flowers, and celebrates that, as a group, the children received a highly commended award from the Botanic Gardens in Edinburgh.

*S6M-00483 Monica Lennon: Publication of Draft International Ecocide Law Honours the Memory of Scottish Barrister, Polly Higgins—That the Parliament welcomes the work of the Independent Expert Panel for the Legal Definition of Ecocide, which was co-chaired by Professor Philippe Sands QC, of University College London and the UN jurist and former prosecutor, Dior Fall Sow; understands that the expert drafting panel of 12 highly-renowned international criminal and environmental lawyers has defined ecocide as "unlawful or wanton acts committed with knowledge that there is a substantial likelihood of severe and widespread or long-term damage to the environment being caused by those acts" with the aim of it being adopted by the International Criminal Court (ICC) to sit alongside genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and the crime of aggression as a fifth international crime; understands that support for an ecocide law is gaining momentum around the world, with recorded interest from France, Finland, Spain, Luxembourg, the Maldives and, in principle, support by the European Parliament; further believes that Belgium is the first European nation to have raised criminalising ecocide at the ICC and that Pope Francis, President Emmanuel Macron, Greta Thunberg and Dr Jane Goodall are among the high-profile supporters; welcomes what it sees as the emergence of broad international consensus for the recognition of ecocide as a crime as an important step toward holding corporate and government decision-makers accountable for environmental damages and abuses, such as oil spills, mass deforestation, ocean damage and the severe pollution of waters, and considers the publication of the proposed legal definition of ecocide to be a fitting tribute to the Scottish barrister, Polly Higgins, who led a decade-long campaign to put the environment at the heart of international law before her death in 2019.

*S6M-00482 Alexander Stewart: Royal Mail's Stamp Out Scams Campaign—That the Parliament welcomes the Royal Mail online campaign, Stamp Out Scams, which was launched on 22 June 2021 with the aim of keeping the company's customers safe from scammers who seek to commit crime using its brand; understands that, over recent years, some 30,000 websites linked with fraudulent activity involving the Royal Mail have been taken down; acknowledges that it continues to work closely with law enforcement organisations to provide as much intelligence that it can to bring an end to scams; notes that the new campaign provides customers with valuable information regarding how to spot scams, as well as tips on how to report them; recognises that, at the heart of the campaign, is a video hosted by a Royal Mail delivery person on how customers can differentiate between real and fake messages from the service; believes that the Royal Mail wants the public to be aware that it only sends email and text notifications when the customer has requested tracking and that it will only ask the recipient to make a payment by email or text when a customs' charge is due, noting that, in such cases, the recipient will also receive a "fee to pay" card through the door, a card that is also posted for unpaid or underpaid postage; acknowledges that the Royal Mail, which has updated its online customer guidance on these matters, is
