*S6M-02160 Mercedes Villalba: Human Rights Day 2021, Police Scotland's Role in Promoting Human Rights—That the Parliament notes that 10 December 2021 is Human Rights Day; recognises that the annual awareness event marks the adoption of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights by the UN General Assembly in 1948; acknowledges the reported concerns of organisations, including Pax Christi Scotland, Freedom from Torture, Human Rights Watch, Justice for Columbia and Sri Lanka Campaign for Peace and Justice, regarding the training activities being provided by Police Scotland's International Development and Innovation Unit to the police forces of countries such as Sri Lanka and Columbia, which, it understands, have historical and current records of human rights violations, and notes the calls for it to immediately suspend all of its activities with these countries and, in light of its commitment to be a champion of international human rights, for the Scottish Government to launch a review into the activities of the International Development and Innovation Unit.

*<u>S6M-02175</u> Liam McArthur: World First for Orkney Synthetic Aviation Fuel—That the Parliament recognises what it understands is a world-first successful flight using only synthetic aviation fuel, developed in Orkney; congratulates Group Captain Peter Hackett on successfully completing a short flight in an Ikarus c42 microlight aircraft powered by the synthetic aviation fuel at Cotswolds Airport; understands that the Orkney-based firms, IGTL and EMEC, both contributed to the development of the zero-petroleum synthetic UL91 fuel, which is manufactured by extracting hydrogen from water, and carbon from atmosphere carbon dioxide; acknowledges that the innovation is part of the RAF's Project MARTIN and has the potential to save 80% to 90% of carbon per flight, and is a major development towards the RAF's efforts to be net zero by 2040; commends all those involved in the breakthrough innovation, which demonstrates the potential of eliminating carbon emissions from transport and aviation; believes this is further evidence of the world-leading role that Orkney is playing in renewable innovation, and wishes the project all the very best for continued success and hopeful expansion into commercial aircraft. 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*<u>S6M-02174</u> Murdo Fraser: SSE's Capital Investment Plan—That the Parliament welcomes Perth-based SSE's £12.5 billion plan to accelerate the UK's progress towards net zero; understands that the company plans to spend around £7 million a day on low-carbon infrastructure, which is needed for net zero transition; further understands that SSE plans to increase renewables output and, in the process, create jobs, and wishes the company all the best for the future.

*<u>S6M-02173</u> Fiona Hyslop: Xcite Ageing Well West Lothian Project—That the Parliament commends the work of Xcite Ageing Well West Lothian, a community project promoting healthy and active lifestyles for adults over 50 across Lothian, for its efforts to improve physical health, mental health and wellbeing in later life and in supporting the management of conditions such as menopause, musculoskeletal conditions and osteoporosis; notes that the project has been partfunded by the NHS in partnership with Paths for All, West Lothian Care Activity Network, Age Scotland, OPAL, Craigshill Good Neighbour Network, Put Your West Foot Forward, West Lothian Volunteer Network and Alzheimer Scotland; further notes that the project is part of a wider range of health walks supported by Paths for All; understands that there are approximately 300,000 people living in Scotland with osteoporosis, which is an incurable health condition; believes that this figure is likely to rise as the average age of the population increases, and wishes the project continued success in helping to meet the needs of people across West Lothian.

*<u>S6M-02163</u> Gillian Mackay: Falkirk FC Offers Free Tickets to Worthy Fans—That the Parliament commends Falkirk FC on its recent North Stand incentive scheme, which offers free match-day tickets to supporters; notes that the scheme was launched on 28 August 2021 and that, since then, the club has distributed free tickets to NHS staff, social workers, students, veterans and serving armed forces personnel, and acknowledges that, on 20 November, it will open its doors to refuse workers.

*<u>S6M-02152</u> Rhoda Grant: Commendation for Hebridean Social Enterprises—That the Parliament congratulates Uist and Lewis in the Outer Hebrides on being awarded Scotland's first Social Enterprise Place Award; considers that the people in these island areas work tirelessly to build community wealth and resilience; understands that the Outer Hebrides has 122 social enterprises, the equivalent of 45 per 10,000 people, making it the second densest population of social enterprise in Scotland; notes that social enterprises have created assets, installed infrastructure and supported hundreds of jobs in the islands; acknowledges their importance in making Scotland a thriving and desirable place to live, and commends the hard work and commitment of the communities of Uist and Lewis in ensuring that social enterprises will continue to provide essential support throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond.

*<u>S6M-02151</u> Alexander Stewart: Alva Academy Raises Over £400,000 for Macmillan Cancer Support—That the Parliament congratulates Alva Academy on its announcement at a special assembly on 5 November 2021 that it raised £51,500.83 for the 2021 Macmillan Cancer Support fundraising drive after its pupils, led by the S6 cadre, took on a range of sponsored events and activities; understands that this money will pay for every grant given out by Macmillan across Clackmannanshire, including for nursing care, bedding and clothing for people undergoing treatment, bereavement counselling and booklets that provide comfort and advice; notes that, over the last 20 years, the school has raised over £400,000 for Macmillan; understands that it is the charity's biggest non-corporate fundraiser; notes that, at the special assembly, the pupils were given messages of thanks from representatives of the good cause from across the UK; commends the pupils, their parents and guardians and the school's staff for their selfless work for the benefit and wellbeing of people that they will probably never even meet; believes that this work has helped them embrace the school's values, develop skills and create good memories, despite the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on everyone, and sends its best wishes to Macmillan and all at the school. Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
