*S6M-03048 Jenni Minto: Recognition of Dr Elsie Inglis—That the Parliament considers that Dr Elsie Inglis, who was born in 1864 and died in 1917, was a pioneering Scottish doctor and surgeon, who became the founder of women's medical practices and hospitals located within the city of Edinburgh; recognises her work and achievements during the First World War, including becoming a suffragist and founder of the Scottish Women's Hospitals for Foreign Service, sending qualified teams of female nurses to Belgium, France, Serbia and Russia; notes the fundraising campaign to honour her life and recognise her work in the city of Edinburgh by commemorating her with a statue, and commends everyone who is involved with the campaign and their fundraising efforts planned for March 2022, which include a Girlguiding sponsored "Sit Still" on the Meadows, and various afternoon teas being held at the City Chambers and the Royal College of Surgeons Edinburgh.

*S6M-03022 Fulton MacGregor: Phenylketonuria (PKU)—That the Parliament recognises that phenylketonuria (PKU) is a rare metabolic condition where the body cannot process phenylalanine, an amino acid found in protein foods; understands that prolonged exposure to protein in their diet can result in people with PKU experiencing significant health issues, including brain damage; further understands that, at present, children and adults with PKU must follow an extreme dietary regime by cutting out almost all protein, weighing food and taking supplements, leaving them unable to make any spontaneous food choices or enjoy the same food as other people; understands that the drug, sapropterin, can assist in giving eligible people with PKU, including those in the Coatbridge and Chryston constituency, and across Scotland, some normality in their diet, and that the manufacturer of Kuvan, BioMarin Pharmaceutical, previously had an application for the drug turned down by the Scottish Medicines Consortium on grounds of cost; further understands that generic versions of sapropterin are now available; notes the calls on BioMarin Pharmaceutical to submit a new application, and further notes the calls on the NHS to explore any and all options to procure generic versions of sapropterin for prescription to eligible patients across Scotland.

*S6M-03021 Jenni Minto: Port Ellen Playing Fields Motorhome Facilities—That the Parliament congratulates Argyll and Bute Council and South Islay Development on being awarded funding of £370,000 from the Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund for the Port Ellen Playing Fields Motorhome Facilities project; notes that this will be phase one of the development of the Port Ellen playing fields site; understands that the project will increase motorhome electric hook-up site capacity from four to 12 spaces, to satisfy growing demand, and will entail an upgrade to the disposal site capability for chemical, black and grey waste; further understands that, in addition, a new shower, toilet and laundry facility will be provided, alongside much-needed recycling facilities; recognises what it sees as the hard work of all those involved in the project, and wishes them every success for the future.

*S6M-03020 Michelle Thomson: Queen Aimee and Her Bo'ness Children's Fair Festival Retinue 2022—That the Parliament congratulates Queen elect, Aimee, who, it understands, has been voted as this year's Bo'ness Children's Fair Festival Queen by her peers in Bo'ness Public Primary School, and will be crowned at this year's Bo'ness Fair Day; hopes that this year will be the first year since 2019 that the celebration can take place in person; understands that it was held virtually in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic; congratulates all who have been selected as part of this year's retinue, including Ladies in Waiting, Fairies, Maids of Honour, Queen's Champion, Heralds, Sceptre Bearer, Sword Bearer, Yeoman of the Guard, Page Boys and Guards of Honour; understands that the Bo'ness Fair, in its current format, was first launched 120 years ago, in 1897, by the then Provost, George Cadell Stewart, and has been held every year since, with the exception of the years of the First and Second World Wars, and the industrial depressions of 1921 and 1926; further understands that the festival is believed to be one of the largest and most popular events of its type across the UK; notes what it sees as the importance of festivals, like the Bo'ness Fair, in encouraging community spirit and in celebrating the heritage of communities across Scotland; looks forward to this year's Bo'ness Fair, and wishes Queen elect Aimee, her retinue, and all Bo'nessians, the very best for this year's event and for the future.

*S6M-03017 Ariane Burgess: Caithness Broch Project—That the Parliament recognises the Caithness Broch Project's plans to build the first broch in Scotland in 2,000 years; congratulates the organisation on its efforts to create a visitor attraction that, it believes, will bring people to Caithness from all over the country; understands that the structure will be built by only using methods available in the Iron Age, and will include a combination of features found in broch construction, and celebrates what it sees as the unprecedented nature of this project.

*S6M-03015 Liam McArthur: Orkney Sports Awards 2021—That the Parliament recognises the Orkney Sports Awards 2021, which took place on 28 January 2022; notes that the awards are sponsored by The Orcadian and various other local businesses, and organised by Orkney Islands Council's active schools team, with the aim of recognising and celebrating sporting achievement and success within the county; understands that there were 27 nominees for the eight awards, which took place at the Orkney Theatre in Kirkwall with an in-person ceremony for nominees that was live-streamed to the wider public; congratulates Matthew Byers, who was crowned Orkney's

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Sportsperson of the Year for 2021, ahead of his debut at the British Weightlifting Senior Championships, and Max Linklater, who picked up the Young Sportsperson of the Year, after an impressive year competing for Orkney at national level across various athletic disciplines; acknowledges and congratulates the other award winners, John Cairns, Coach of the Year, Michael Swanney and Melissa Lindsay, Volunteer and Schools Sports Volunteer of the Year respectively, Orkney RFC's First XV and under-16s, Team and Youth Team of the Year respectively, and Orkney's inter-county football team, which won Performance of the Year for what it sees as the outstanding win against Shetland in July 2021, which secured the Milne Cup and marked Orkney's first win in Shetland for 40 years; welcomes the Services to Sports awards, which, it understands, were presented to two stalwarts of Orkney sport, Calvin Poke in football and Fraser Murray in athletics; further congratulates Rognvald Omand, Betty Stanger and Melvin Wick, who were all inducted into the Orkney Sports Hall of Fame, supported by SportsScotland, for their achievements in swimming, squash and badminton respectively; believes that all of the nominees and winners reflect the strength, breadth and depth of sporting talent in Orkney; pays tribute to all the volunteers, family members and sponsors who make sport possible for all ages and abilities; believes that the importance of sport and physical activity has been underscored during the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic; thanks the Orkney Islands Council's active schools team for its hard work in organising the 2021 Orkney Sports Awards, and looks forward to celebrating more Orkney sporting success over the course of the next 12 months.

*S6M-03014 Pam Gosal: Asda Stores Introducing a Permanent Quiet Hour Across its Stores—That the Parliament commends Asda stores for introducing a quiet hour to help customers with hidden disabilities; recognises that stores with loud noises, bright lights and a large volume of people can be stressful for some customers; understands that Asda stores across the West of Scotland region and the rest of the country will benefit from the hour on Monday to Thursday at 2.00 pm; further understands that there are an estimated 14.1 million disabled people living in the UK, and that 80% of disabilities are hidden, and believes that, by introducing quieter times for customers to shop, it will help to make the shopping experience more welcoming and inclusive for customers with additional needs.

*S6M-03013 Pam Gosal: St Ninian's High School Pupils Achieve Silver Status Accreditation From UNICEF—That the Parliament congratulates pupils at St Ninian's High School in Kirkintilloch, on achieving Silver status accreditation from UNICEF; understands that the RSS Rights Respecting Schools group has worked hard to raise £607 for the UN Afghan Emergency Appeal Fund; further understands that the 15 Ambassadors have raised awareness for events and projects that aim to help pupils understand and empathise with those less fortunate; notes that the pupils ran a Rights Respecting Schools podcast, which is now available on Spotify, and gives interviews with staff, pupils and the wider community, helping to raise awareness of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), and applauds the podcast for working with the library, the Well-bean café and the Equalities group, and for raising the profile of events such as Active Girls Day, the school show and Anti-Bullying week.

*S6M-03011 Sharon Dowey: National Independent Venue Week —That the Parliament notes that 31 January to 6 February 2022 is national Independent Venue Week; understands that IVW is a seven-day celebration of music venues around the country and the people who own, run and work in them; recognises what it sees as the valuable role that independent music venues play in

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developing the next generation of talent, providing many artists with their first experience of playing live in front of an audience; notes what it sees as the wider role that these venues play as community, cultural and creative hubs, and voices its support for the sector, which, it believes, has been hit hard during the COVID-19 pandemic.

*S6M-03006 Clare Adamson: Friends of Hartwood Paupers Graveyard—The Parliament commends the residents of Hartwood who founded The Friends of Hartwood Paupers Cemetery, and the volunteers from across Wishaw and Motherwell and the wider Lanarkshire community, who dedicate their time to restoring the Old Lanarkshire Asylum Cemetery; notes that from 1895 to 1954 there were 1255 people interred in 634, mainly anonymous, graves, within the small area; understands that after extensive research, information boards are now installed on-site, naming all 1,255 people and reuniting living family members with long last relatives; commends BBC Scotland's programme, *My Kind of Town*, hosted by Ian Hamilton and his guide dog, Major, on highlighting the past, present and the future vision of the cemetery; acknowledges what it sees as the positive impact that this project has had on the wellbeing of all those involved and which, it considers, reflects the changing approach to mental health with an emphasis on a person-centred and empathetic perspective; thanks all involved for their efforts, and wishes them the best for the future.
