Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-03023 Colin Smyth: Ethical Principles in Wildlife Management—That the Parliament notes reports that thousands of animals and birds are taken and killed in wildlife management operations every year, including in the South Scotland region; considers that these are sentient beings that are capable of experiencing pain and suffering; notes the view that Scotland should lead the way in sustainable and humane interaction with the wild animals in the environment; notes the belief that wildlife management should be governed by ethical principles, such as the international consensus principles for ethical wildlife control, which recommend that efforts to control wildlife should, wherever possible: alter the human practices that cause human-wildlife conflict and develop a culture of coexistence, be justified by evidence that significant harms are being caused to people, property, livelihoods, ecosystems, and/or other animals, have measurable outcome-based objectives that are clear, achievable, monitored, and adaptive, minimise animal welfare harms and be confined to the fewest number of animals, be informed by community values as well as scientific, technical, and practical information, be integrated into plans for systematic long-term management, and be based on the specifics of the situation rather than negative labels such as "pest" or "overabundant", and notes the view that there are opportunities to integrate ethical principles into the Scottish Government's strategic approach to wildlife management and its species licensing review. R

*S6M-02957 Gillian Martin: Marie Curie's Great Daffodil Appeal 2022—That the Parliament welcomes Marie Curie's Great Daffodil Appeal 2022, which runs throughout March; praises Marie Curie nursing and hospice staff who have been on the frontline throughout the COVID-19 pandemic for providing palliative and end of life care support to hundreds of dying people, their families, and carers, including in the Aberdeenshire East constituency; understands that Marie Curie cared for over 9,000 people in Scotland during 2020-21, which is reportedly the highest number of patients cared for in a single year since the charity was established 70 years ago; commends what it sees as the dedication, hard work and contribution of Marie Curie volunteers across Scotland; considers that the pandemic has highlighted how crucial access to palliative and end of life care is for terminally ill people to ensure a positive end of life experience that reflects what is important to the individual; understands that Marie Curie needs to raise £250,000 per week to support its frontline services; commends the vital care and support that Marie Curie provides across local authorities and hospices; praises the Marie Curie Information and Support services,

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which are available for everyone affected by terminal illness, including for bereavement support, and the volunteer Helper services, which have adapted during the pandemic to continue providing what it sees as vital emotional support, companionship, and information to terminally ill people, their carers, and families; believes that wearing the daffodil pin unites millions of people who consider that dying people should get the care and support that they need, and notes the calls encouraging as many people as possible to support the Marie Curie Great Daffodil Appeal in March 2022.

*S6M-03065 Sandesh Gulhane: Cancer Research UK Scotland Centre—That the Parliament congratulates the University of Glasgow, along with joint partner, the University of Edinburgh, for securing part of a £100 million investment from Cancer Research UK to jointly form the Cancer Research UK Scotland Centre; understands that the Cancer Research UK Scotland Centre has been selected as one of seven cancer research centres across the UK to receive investment over a five year period; notes that the funding will support essential research infrastructure, including technical staff, equipment, pump-priming grants and training, to further develop the breadth and depth of research at each of these seven centres; understands that the application process for funding was highly competitive, culminating in interview and review by an international panel of leading experts; further understands that the review panel commended the high quality of the proposals and strength of the network, and believes that this is a notable achievement for the Universities of Glasgow and Edinburgh, reflecting what it sees as their importance as partners in the United Kingdom's network of world-leading translational research hubs that drive local collaborations between universities, NHS hospitals and other research organisations, accelerating the transition of lab-based discovery science to the clinic for the benefit of people affected by cancer. R

*S6M-03047 Clare Adamson: Tommy Brennan, Convenor of Shop Stewards—That the Parliament notes with sadness the passing of the convenor of shop stewards at Ravenscraig Steelworks, Tommy Brennan; notes with admiration the way in which, it believes, Tommy dedicated his life and career to fighting the closure of the Scotland's steel industry during the 1980s and 90s; recognises that, following the closure of Ravenscraig, Tommy became a trustee of the Scottish Steelworkers Memorial Fund, which was set up to commemorate those who lost their lives in the Scottish iron and steelmaking industry, as well as an official of Steelworkers' Community Union; believes that this demonstrates a lifelong dedication to protecting and promoting the interests of workers and their families; understands that, away from his union activities, Tommy was also a regular on the Burns Supper circuit, a committee member at Shotts Bon Accord and emerged as a proponent of Scottish Independence during the referendum; believes that the outpouring of messages of condolence from figures across the country is a reflection of the number of lives that Tommy touched and how respected he was as an individual; praises Tommy for his work, and offers its condolences to his family, friends, and colleagues in the wake of his passing.
