\*S6M-02974 Paul O'Kane: 50th Anniversary of Bloody Sunday—That the Parliament recognises the 50th anniversary of Bloody Sunday on 30 January 2022; notes that, in what became known as Bloody Sunday, 13 men and teenagers were shot dead, with a 14th victim dying later from injuries, by British soldiers in Derry in 1972, while participating in a peaceful protest march organised by the Northern Ireland Civil Rights Association; understands that 12 others were shot and wounded, that all were unarmed and were not posing a threat of causing death or serious injury, and that many were shot while fleeing or assisting other civilians who were injured; acknowledges the inquiry by Lord Saville of Newdigate initiated in 1998 and subsequent report published in 2010, which found that unjustifiable firing by soldiers was the cause of deaths and injuries; further acknowledges the UK Government's unqualified acceptance of the report and that the killings were "unjustified" and "unjustifiable", as described in the subsequent apology by the then Prime Minister, David Cameron, and believes that the 50th anniversary is a moment for reflection on the darkest days of the troubles in Northern Ireland, which impacted people who lived there and many of their families living in the West Scotland region and other parts of Scotland, a time to remember those who died and an opportunity to learn from the past and move forward in peace and reconciliation.

\*S6M-02968 Alexander Stewart: ASA Forces Charity Receives the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme Bronze Award—That the Parliament congratulates ASA Forces Charity (ASA Scotland) on receiving the bronze award from the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme in recognition of its support to the Armed Forces Covenant and the UK Armed Forces as a whole; considers that the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme recognises commitment and support from UK employers for defence personnel, and commends the ASA Forces Charity on its focused

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commitment towards the Armed Forces Covenant, and for its tireless work for the benefit of HM Forces personnel, veterans, their families and military communities right across Scotland.

That the Parliament recognises the immense sacrifices that veterans have made; agrees that veterans and their loved ones deserve to be fairly compensated for injury, illness and death occurring during active service; notes the concerns of advocacy groups that the current process for claiming War Pensions and Armed Forces Compensation payments is not fit for purpose; further notes that these advocacy groups assert that many veterans give up on claims due to the system's complexity and a lack of support in applying; understands that advocacy groups have deep concerns about Veterans UK's current practice in assigning medical assessors to claims; further understands that veterans are at high risk of poor mental health, poverty and suicide, and calls on the UK Government to honour its duty of care to veterans by launching an independent inquiry into the failings of the current system.

\*S6M-02956 Rona Mackay: Tribute to Mr John Jaap—That the Parliament pays tribute to the late Mr John Jaap, whose life in Kirkintilloch and the surrounding areas brought much joy to the constituents of Strathkelvin and Bearsden; understands that Mr Jaap was nominated for the Freedom of Kirkintilloch in 2012 and recognised by the Provost for his commitment to the local area and its residents; commends his 25 years of service with the local authority in public-facing roles; delights that his musical talents as an accomplished musician led him to become the organist in several local churches, the resident musician in a social club, active member of dance bands, and a popular provider of uplifting musical events in local care homes; recognises that Mr Jaap founded and coordinated the Lenzie Musical Association in the 1970s, and became heavily involved in arranging music, leading rehearsals, and conducting for this choral and orchestral group; commends the sharing of his experience, knowledge and reflections through an online blog, which has gathered much momentum; celebrates the life of whom it considers to be a quite incredible gentleman, and sends its condolences to his family, friends, ex-colleagues, and all those whose lives were touched by Mr Jaap's warmth and generosity of spirit.

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had been looking to identify the fallen RAF flight engineer; understands that Ian Dickson, David's cousin, made contact with Mr Boshuisen, who has been voluntarily maintaining the grave and managed to finally secure photographs after around 75 years; considers that the Dutch War Graves Commission, which is understood to have been initially looking to include a uniform appearance at all graves, has now attached a small plaque beside the grave that contains a photograph, which the airman's granddaughter sent in 2020, and a precis about the missions; understands that Sgt David Dickson, whose father was a shunter for the railway at Tillicoultry, was one of seven crew on a Lancaster bomber, based at RAF Kirmington, Lincolnshire, with No. 166 Squadron, which took off late in the evening in May 1944 to bomb Duisburg in the Ruhr, but, as it returned, was spotted by a German fighter pilot over the Dutch coast and was shot down; sends its condolences to Sgt Dickson's family, and wishes them all the best in their future travels once they are able to revisit his grave.
