Members' Business motions that have achieved cross party support

*S6M-04821 Miles Briggs: Cancer Card—That the Parliament acknowledges what it sees as the tremendous work by Jen Hardy in establishing Cancer Card in Scotland, which is an initiative that provides people with access to vital cancer support services and information regarding their diagnosis in one place; understands that, after her own incurable breast cancer diagnosis in 2017, Jen was struck by the realisation that there was no single place for her to obtain useful information related to her illness, which motivated her to establish Cancer Card; further understands that this community can help people diagnosed with cancer, including people in the Lothian region, to find the support that they require, minimising stress during an already highly stressful time; recognises that Cancer Card attained charity status in 2021; considers that it can play an integral role in securing relief and comfort to cancer patients, and welcomes the appointment of lan Pirrie as Cancer Card's first CEO.

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-04754 Katy Clark: Bus Services—That the Parliament believes that local bus services are a lifeline that enable communities to access essential services, but that they are currently in a state of crisis; understands that bus fares have risen by 58% in real terms since 1995; further understands that rail passenger journeys fell by 43% between 1986-97 and 2019-20; notes with concern the reported cancellation of dozens of bus journeys in Ayrshire by the operator, Stagecoach, due to "staff shortages"; further notes the reported comments by the Confederation of Passenger Transport UK – Scotland (CPT), which represents operators, indicating that vacancies have doubled since 2019 to an average of 12.5% across Scotland; notes the reported findings of a survey in November 2021 by Unite the Union of members in the sector across the UK, which found that 91% believed drivers were leaving the industry due to pay, 89% due to working conditions and 68% due to long hours; further notes the view that the Scotlish Government should ensure that minimum fair work standards are in place for all bus operators in Scotland;

understands with concern that only 38 people were supported to train as bus and coach drivers via the employability fund in 2019-20, and fewer than five were supported in 2020-21 and the first quarter of 2021-22; notes the view that the Scottish Government should provide investment so that more drivers are able to receive subsidised training, and to increase recruitment in the sector; considers that municipal bus ownership is an opportunity to reverse falling passenger numbers, cut fare costs and improve standards, and notes the calls on the Scottish Government to provide significant funding and resources so that local authorities are incentivised to develop these networks.

*S6M-04693 Clare Adamson: Child Safety Week 2022—That the Parliament marks Child Safety Week, the flagship annual community awareness campaign run by the Child Accident Prevention Trust (CAPT); understands that Child Safety Week takes place between 6 and 12 June 2022 with the theme, Safety in Mind, encouraging parents and carers to think of safety, particularly when under pressure; considers that Child Safety Week acts as a catalyst for thousands of conversations and events across the UK with the aim of building awareness, knowledge and confidence around risks to children and helping to prevent accidents; acknowledges that accidents to children represent a serious public health issue, with safety organisations such as RoSPA outlining that child accidents are a major cause of preventable death, serious injury and long-term disability; understands that accidents disproportionately affect children from more deprived backgrounds, with falls accounting for the majority of non-fatal accidents, and threats to breathing such as suffocation, strangulation and choking causing the highest number of deaths; notes the research from CAPT that indicates that, although it is difficult to give a true cost of treating children's accidents as outpatients and inpatients, in the past, it has been estimated at more than £275 million a year and that it can cost as much as £250,000 to treat one severe bath water scald; understands that most home accidents are preventable through increased awareness, improvements in the home environment and greater product safety, which it considers makes awareness initiatives such as Child Safety Week vital endeavours; commends the efforts of all organisations that work together to increase the safety of children and young people, and wishes everyone involved with Child Safety Week every success.

*S6M-04665 Katy Clark: First Aid Regulation—That the Parliament notes with concern the reported lack of regulation of private first aid companies; understands that private first aid companies are regularly employed to provide medical cover at events across Scotland, including sporting events, live music events and nightclubs; further understands that these companies can be accredited as providers by the Scottish Qualifications Authority but that there is no official body tasked with carrying out regular audits and inspections; believes that unlicensed first aiders providing controlled drugs or treatment to members of the public is dangerous, unacceptable and to the detriment of public health; understands that private medical and first aid companies are governed by the Care Quality Commission in England and Wales, which carries out regular inspections and requires companies to provide evidence of training, equipment, vehicles, processes and policies, and notes the view that the Scottish Government should seek to review existing structures with a view to developing equivalent processes that ensure there is sufficient oversight of all first aid providers in Scotland, including in the West Scotland region.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
