*<u>S6M-04285</u> Clare Adamson: World Fibromyalgia Awareness Day—That the Parliament recognises that 12 May is World Fibromyalgia Awareness Day; understands that Fibromyalgia (FM) is a long-term chronic pain condition, although some people can also experience many other symptoms; further understands that there is no specific test, nor cure, that it is often misdiagnosed and the exact cause remains unknown; understands that anyone can develop symptoms, that it has been reported in all age groups, including children, but generally develops between the ages of 30 and 50, and affects seven times more women than men; further understands that one in 20 people may be affected by FM symptoms of some degree at some time during their life; expresses concern at reports that FM is often not recognised as the debilitating condition that it believes that it is, where it affects individuals' ability to work and carry out everyday tasks, as symptoms and the intensity of pain can vary from hour to hour and day to day; welcomes what it sees as the Scottish Government's commitment to making improvements for those living with chronic pain, through continued funding into research, and applauds all campaigners and support groups across the country, who continue to raise awareness of FM, providing support to those affected and their care support networks, offering advice, guidance, advocacy and providing educative information.

*<u>S6M-04284</u> Maurice Golden: Fun First Named the Military Family Charity of 2022—That the Parliament congratulates Fun First on being named the Military Family Charity of 2022 at the Celebrating Forces Families awards reception; understands that the charity is based in Helensburgh and provides fun and educational sessions to local pre-school children and their families, both in Helensburgh and nearby communities; recognises the support that Fun First provided to families during the COVID-19 pandemic, through online sessions, the introduction of a new Fun First Babies group to support new parents, and the creation of a mothers walking group; believes that this award is well deserved, and wishes those behind the charity every success in continuing their important work in service of the armed forces community.

*<u>S6M-04276</u> Colin Beattie: Recognition for Dalkeith-based Ewan Galloway—That the Parliament recognises Ewan Galloway from Dalkeith for his work during the COVID-19 pandemic; understands that during lockdown Ewan created The Stagger Inn, a virtual pub where people could join and see Ewan perform; commends how Ewan brought many people together through tough times and played for people across the world on platforms such as Facebook and YouTube; understands that he still continues to entertain online for those who cannot access venues to see him perform and also recently held an in-person event in Perth over Easter that was well attended;

*S6M-04275 Emma Harper: ME Awareness Day 2022—That the Parliament notes that ME Awareness Day is 12 May 2022; notes that the date was chosen as it encompasses the birthday of Florence Nightingale, who was believed to have chronic fatigue syndrome; understands that ME, myalgic encephalomyelitis, which is commonly referred to as chronic fatigue syndrome and, according to the World Health Organization (WHO), shares characteristics with fibromyalgia, affects around 20,000 people in Scotland, and is defined by WHO as a neurological condition that can cause extreme tiredness and is often linked to depression, social isolation and loneliness; understands that ME affects each person differently, but that the main symptoms include postexertional malaise, a period of intense exhaustion that lasts for more than 24 hours following exertion, chronic pain, sleep disturbance, as well as flu-like symptoms such as headache, sore throat, painful lymph nodes, dizziness, nausea and problems with memory and concentration; further understands that, while the causes of ME remain unclear, there is evidence that suggests that the condition is caused by a change in a person's immune system and the way in which it responds to infection or stress, and that ME shares some features of autoimmune illnesses, which are diseases in which the immune system attacks healthy tissues in the body, like in rheumatoid arthritis; understands that continued research is currently underway across the globe into the link between COVID-19 infection and ME, with researchers, including at the University of the West of Scotland, examining whether long COVID shares similar characteristics with ME, and thanks the charity, Action for ME, as well as local ME support groups, including the Dumfries and Galloway ME, Fibromyalgia and Chronic Fatigue Support Group, for all that they do to support and lobby for the interests of people living with ME.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
