Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*<u>S6M-11509</u> Ruth Maguire: International Insights, A Model for Scotland—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of the report, *International Insights*, by A Model For Scotland, which is a campaign group for progressive prostitution law reform; considers that the report highlights important findings related to what Scotland can learn from international efforts to combat commercial sexual exploitation; further considers that, whilst the Scottish Government recognises prostitution as a form of violence against women, and has committed to develop a model for Scotland to challenge men's demand for prostitution, it is currently legal in Scotland to perpetrate and profit from prostitution, and that victims receive sanctions rather than support, including in the Cunninghame South constituency; believes that Scotland's approach to tackling sex trafficking and sexual exploitation can build on the experiences and learning of other countries, and notes the view that Scotland must join the growing number of countries taking action to combat commercial sexual exploitation by ensuring that the new model for Scotland criminalises paying for sex, decriminalises and provides support to women involved in the sex trade and holds pimping websites accountable.

*<u>S6M-11520</u> Bob Doris: Centenary of John MacLean's Passing—That the Parliament recognises the passing of 100 years since the death of John MacLean on 30 November 1923; further recognises MacLean as an ordinary Scot who became a socialist icon; acknowledges the role that MacLean played in Glasgow during the Red Clydeside era; further acknowledges his role in helping to organise the 1915 rent strikes in Glasgow, which led the way to municipal housing, and his role in organising Clydeside's workers across engineering and shipbuilding; understands that up to 20,000 people attended his funeral march and that, 100 years on, MacLean remains an important figure to many Glaswegians and folk all over Scotland; acknowledges the significant contribution that he has made to the rich social and political legacy of Glasgow and Scotland, which it considers should be recognised and celebrated; praises the organisers of a song-writing competition being held at Pollokshaws Burgh Hall, and the organisers of Celtic Connections, which will host *Red Clydeside: John MacLean Centenary Concert* at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall in January 2024, to deliver an evening of music in tribute to a man loved by the people of Glasgow

and feared by those in power; recognises the work of people such as Nan Milton (nee MacLean), who helped keep the memory of her father alive, and other contemporary figures such as Donald Anderson, who, with others in the John MacLean Society, remains determined to erect a statue of MacLean as a lasting memorial; acknowledges MacLean's vision in calling for an independent Scotland, and considers that such calls have only grown and that Scottish independence is increasingly viewed by many as essential to delivering a socially just and outward looking Scotland.

*<u>S6M-11514</u> John Swinney: Recognising the Success of the Highland Chocolatier at the International Chocolate Awards—That the Parliament recognises the Highland Chocolatier, in Highland Perthshire, for its exceptional achievement at the International Chocolate Awards; acknowledges that lain Burnett's velvet truffles were the only truffles from the UK judged by the grand jury to proceed to the world finals, where they retained the title of Best White Truffle in the World; notes that, at the world finals in Florence, Italy, these truffles won gold, silver, and bronze awards, along with three special awards for their outstanding recipes, textures and craftsmanship, and individual accolades for the caramel velvet truffle (dual silver), and the passion fruit and mango velvet truffle (bronze); celebrates the over 60 national and international accolades received by Iain's small family-run chocolatier, including world gold three times, and recognises the contribution of the entire team and the importance of local ingredients and careful craftsmanship to their success.

*S6M-11450 Karen Adam: Seabird Census—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the global importance of Scotland's seabird populations; underscores what it believes is their status as one of Scotland's, and the world's, most precious biodiversity treasures; welcomes the publication of the latest Seabird Census across Scotland, England, Wales, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland, which provides evidence on the status and trends in those populations; understands that the census reveals that, of the 20 species for which there is confidence in the trends in Scotland, 14 species (70%) have declined since the last census 20 years ago; further understands that Scotland's seabird abundance index declined by 49% between 1986 and 2019; considers that the census was conducted before highly pathogenic avian influenza further devastated the seabird population; notes with concern reports that, of the three Scottish seabirds shown by the census to have increased, two of these, the northern gannet and great skua, are thought to be most severely affected by highly pathogenic avian influenza; believes that the success of conservation measures, such as the Shiants Islands Seabird Recovery Project, the Biosecurity for LIFE project and the monitoring and mitigation of seabird bycatch globally, signal that it is possible to take constructive action for seabirds that will help them recover and build their resilience to current and future pressures, and believes that the forthcoming Scottish Seabird conservation strategy and the strategic framework for biodiversity, which is currently under consultation, should deliver urgent and ambitious action to reverse what it sees as the catastrophic trends in Scotland's seabirds.

Members' Bills Proposals

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
