Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-11662 Douglas Lumsden: Declaration to Triple Nuclear Energy Launched at COP28— That the Parliament recognises the Declaration to Triple Nuclear Energy, which was signed by a number of countries at the COP28; understands that the declaration notes the key role of nuclear energy for achieving global net zero targets by 2050; further understands that the declaration recognises the importance of the application of nuclear science and technology to continue contributing to the monitoring of climate change and the tackling of its impacts, and emphasises the work of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in this regard; notes from the declaration that nuclear energy is already the second-largest source of clean dispatchable baseload power, with benefits for energy security; further notes from the declaration that new nuclear technologies have a small land footprint and can be located where they are needed, such as within a large energy intensive industrial zone, with additional flexibilities that support decarbonisation across the power sector, including hard-to-abate industries; understands that analysis from the International Energy Agency (IAE) shows nuclear energy more than doubling from 2020 to 2050 in global net zero emissions by 2050 scenarios, and shows that decreasing nuclear power would make reaching net zero more difficult and more costly; further understands that analysis from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change shows nuclear energy approximately tripling its global installed electrical capacity from 2020 to 2050 in the average 1.5°C scenario; notes that the declaration was signed by 22 countries, namely the UK, the USA, Canada, France, the Netherlands, Sweden, Finland, Poland, Ukraine, Czechia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Moldova, Mongolia, Morocco, Ghana, Japan, the Republic of Korea and the United Arab Emirates; welcomes the ongoing work and discussions that are taking place on this, including in the North East Scotland region, and notes the view that Scotland should fully consider this option going forwards.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*<u>S6M-11666</u> Ross Greer: Community of Arran Seabed Trust—That the Parliament welcomes the Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST) being recognised as "highly commended" in the Coast and Waters Category at the Nature of Scotland Awards in November 2023; recognises what it sees as the hard work of COAST in conserving, restoring and researching Arran's diverse

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marine environment over the past three decades; understands that the Lamlash Bay No Take Zone (NTZ) was the first community-led marine reserve of its kind in Scotland when established in 2008, following 13 years of campaigning by COAST; further understands that no fish or shellfish can be taken from the waters or seabed of the NTZ, and that damaging towed bottom trawl and dredge fishing are limited or restricted within the wider South Arran Marine Protected Area (MPA); believes that the fisheries management measures around Arran are facilitating recovery; understands that survey data shows a general increase in marine life and complexity of seabed habitats in the NTZ and the density of marine life in the MPA almost doubling, and thanks COAST for what it sees as the active role that it continues to play in the recovery of marine biodiversity around the Isle of Arran, engaging with the local community and championing meaningful action to protect Arran's sea life for generations to come.

*S6M-11665 Stephanie Callaghan: New Community-led Research Award - Healthy Planet, Healthy People—That the Parliament welcomes the launch of a new community-led research award entitled Healthy Planet, Healthy People, delivered by the Royal Society of Edinburgh in partnership with the Williamson Trust; understands that funding will be provided to support new and existing Scotland-based research projects in any discipline that promotes the health of individuals by fostering healthy communities, healthy environments and healthy foods; further understands that Healthy Planet, Healthy People will award 10 pilot projects, led by community organisations, up to £5,000 each, to conduct research for up to 12 months; considers that "community" is defined as a group of people who share an identity-forming narrative; celebrates the creation of new knowledge, or use of existing knowledge, to help build practical solutions to targeted challenges, and notes that applications are welcomed from 16 October 2023 to 22 January 2024.

*S6M-11663 Bill Kidd: Temporary Closure of Summerhill Road Post Office, Drumchapel, Glasgow Anniesland — That the Parliament understands that the Summerhill Road Post Office branch, situated in Drumchapel, in the Glasgow Anniesland constituency, is another branch facing temporary closure; further understands that, as a result of the resignation of the current postmaster, this branch will close on 14 December 2023 until the vacancy can be filled; considers that the potential temporary closure of this branch is another huge loss to a community within Drumchapel and Anniesland; believes that this is both unacceptable and inconvenient and not at all representative of the principles that the Post Office was founded upon, nor the franchise it was sold so cheaply for; considers that this is another hammer blow from the Post Office, particularly for older members of the Drumchapel community; believes that every option must be explored by the Post Office to ensure that the vacancy is permanently filled, including whether it is paying enough for the position to be viable; considers that this is particularly important as, it understands, the Anniesland Cross Post Office was temporarily closed on 21 April 2023 and has never reopened, despite several meetings with Post Office officials, and believes that this can add to the difficulties for constituents reaching alternative branches, depending on their mobility and access to public or private transport.

*<u>S6M-11661</u> Rachael Hamilton: Borders Children's Charity Receives Over £110,000 from Lottery Community Funding—That the Parliament congratulates Berwickshire Swap on its funding success from the National Lottery Community Fund, having recently been awarded over

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£110,000; understands that Berwickshire Swap is a Borders charity that helps organise and deliver children's clothing swaps with donations, helping to tackle clothing poverty and deprivation across the Borders region; considers that this multi-year funding will see the two vital project managers at Berwickshire Swap continue their positions for another three years; notes that the funding will support Berwickshire Swap's expansion in the Borders and East Lothian, which, it believes, is especially important considering the rising demand for its services during the current cost of living crisis and the growing interest in sustainable consumerism; understands that the Borders charity has held 23 swaps in 2023 alone and that it expects to have the largest swap of the year in the run-up to Christmas; acknowledges that the charity has seen over 850 attendees sign up for swaps in 2023 so far, helping over 1,500 children; wishes the charity the best of luck in the year ahead, and hopes that it is just as successful as 2023.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
