#### Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*S6M-11728 Ariane Burgess: Celebrating Scotland's National Native Woodlands—That the Parliament notes the 10th anniversary, on 29 January 2024, of Scots pine becoming Scotland's national tree; understands that Caledonian pinewoods are unique to Scotland, and are the natural home of Scots pine; considers that Scotland is globally important for Caledonian pinewoods and Atlantic rainforest, and therefore has a special responsibility to protect and restore them; understands that both types of woodland support a wealth of biodiversity and can help mitigate against the impacts of climate change; notes the belief that browsing by deer and the spread of invasive non-native species means that many Caledonian pinewoods and Atlantic rainforests will not survive without urgent action; believes that these pressures impact all native woodlands across Scotland; notes the support for landscape-scale deer management and targeted grant funding to enable their restoration; further notes the view that Forestry and Land Scotland should continue to take a leadership role in this restoration, especially in the removal of invasive nonnative species such as rhododendron; notes what it sees as the growing number of private landowners involved in pinewood and rainforest restoration, including at Glen Loyne in East Glen Quoich, Highlands, and thanks environmental groups like Trees for Life, Woodland Trust Scotland and Plantlife, as well as community groups such as Arkaig Community Forest in the Highlands, Langholm Initiative in the Borders, Highland Perthshire Communities Land Trust, Argyll Coast and Communities Trust, and others in the Community Woodlands Association, for their efforts to restore Scotland's native woodlands.

#### Other new and altered motions and amendments

\*S6M-11745 Jeremy Balfour: World Braille Day 2024—That the Parliament recognises World Braille Day on 4 January 2024; understands that this day raises awareness about the importance of Braille and celebrates the legacy of Louis Braille; recognises that, in 2018, the United Nations General Assembly decided to make it an official observance; understands that World Braille Day promotes awareness of the importance of accessibility and inclusion in education and information in the digital age; believes that much can be done for people who have a visual impairment, and commends all of the advocacy that those celebrating World Braille Day do to promote Braille literacy and inclusion for people with visual impairments.

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\*S6M-11742 Carol Mochan: The Importance of the Coalfields Regeneration Trust's Work to Support Women—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of the work carried out by the Coalfields Regeneration Trust (CRT) in Scotland; understands that CRT provides support to communities in former coalfield areas that, to this day, face challenges as a result of what it sees as rapid deindustrialisation and lack of investment; further understands that much of this work focuses on the improvement of health, skills, and employment opportunities, often with a specific focus on supporting women, who, it believes, are understood to spend fewer years in good health than men, are underrepresented in key areas related to STEM, and are disproportionately impacted when it comes to matters such as the gender pay gap; believes that any reduction in the CRT budget would have an adverse impact on its ability to support women and girls living in former coalfield areas in a time when they require greater levels of support, and calls, therefore, on the Scottish Government to reinstate the £100,000 that it understands has been removed from the CRT budget to ensure that CRT can continue to sustain its levels of work, including supporting projects aimed at improving the outcomes and opportunities of women and other key groups in former coalfield areas.

\*S6M-11741 Katy Clark: GEOAmey's Court Custody and Prisoner Escort Services

Contract—That the Parliament expresses its concern at the findings of the Audit Scotland report of December 2023, which outlines what it considers to be failures on the part of GEOAmey in delivering its contractual obligations for Scottish Court Custody and Prisoner Escort Services; understands that the PCS and GMB trade unions have expressed concern at what they regard as endemic failings on the part of GEOAmey in relation to the contract; further understands that the PCS union has written to the Cabinet Secretary for Justice and Home Affairs to present evidence on these matters; notes the reported concerns of solicitors that a lack of custody staff is leading to delays in courts across Scotland; further notes with concern that GEOAmey is reportedly no longer being fined for contractual breaches; believes that insufficient staffing levels compromise the safety of workers in the justice system, jurors and the wider public; notes that GEOAmey's contract is worth hundreds of millions of pounds, and calls on the Scottish Government to review GEOAmey's contractual obligations with a view to taking further action.

\*S6M-11716 Annie Wells: Docks and Piers Trust Charity Raises Monies for Govan Dry Docks—That the Parliament congratulates the charity, Docks and Piers Trust, on raising £40,000 to carry out the first phase of the reactivation work at Govan Dry Docks, which saw the dock emptied and works carried out on the gate; notes that the charity has also secured £25,000 to fund the next phase, which will include work on the culvert; understands that BAE systems is supporting the charity by providing the keel blocks for the dock by way of a gift, saving the charity £150,000 of its entire budget; acknowledges that the charity was formed in 2020 with the purpose of acquiring the historic docks and piers on the Clyde, with the aim of preserving and improving the structures so that they can be returned to operational condition, enabling the public to experience their heritage and historical significance; recognises that the charity is also interacting with local businesses and philanthropists, with a view to raising the remaining £85,000 needed to cover the cost of new fencing and pumps; notes that the charity has granted a licence to Govan Drydock Ltd to operate Dock No1 on its behalf when the dock reopens, and acknowledges that the budget to reactivate Dock No1 was set at £300,000 and that the charity signed a lease with its owner, Bishop Loch Development Scotland, in 2022.

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Hae Meat, on winning two prestigious titles at *The Herald* Family Business Awards 2023, held in association with Business Gateway; applauds the Paton family on winning the Green Family Business of the Year Award and the Scottish Family Business of the Year (small-medium) Award on the night; understands that the awards recognise legacy and the desire to see family business play a part in communities; further understands that the Girvan-based business launched in 2007 and was named as one of Scotland's top 10 fastest growing food brands by Kantar earlier in 2023; commends Alex and his family for their hard work and commitment to their business, championing diversification and sustainability, and wishes them all continued success in future endeavours.

\*S6M-11714 David Torrance: Kirkcaldy Rugby Club U18 Team Wins SRU National Bowl Final—That the Parliament congratulates Kirkcaldy Rugby Club U18 team after it won the SRU National Bowl Final at the town's Beveridge Park recently; understands that the team, which is led by Balwearie High School Head Boy, Euan Stewart, won the final against Hamilton/Strathaven U18s after having an unbeaten start to the competition; notes that the Kirkcaldy Rugby Club U18 team was coached to victory through some of its toughest matches to date by Kawe Enoka, Alan Pratt, Steve Montgomery with Cara Montgomery in the management roles; recognises that the squad is made up of local boys from Kirkcaldy and the surrounding area, with many of the young men having played together for many years, through the Kirkcaldy Rugby Club's junior team, the Wee Blues, and up into the youth ranks; commends the team for its exceptional teamwork in winning a national competition, especially as for many of the squad it was their last major competition before moving on to senior rugby, and wishes the squad and its management and coaching team all the very best for the future.

<u>S6W-24040</u> Mark Ruskell: To ask the Scottish Government, further to the answer to question S6W-23014 by Neil Gray on 28 November 2023, until such time as the review of the carbon calculator is completed, how it plans to comply with policy 5(c)(ii) of the National Planning Framework 4 by ensuring that developers correctly calculate emissions from the development versus the carbon savings to be made from displacing fossil fuels from the grid.

<u>S6W-24060</u> **Brian Whittle:** To ask the Scottish Government, further to the answer to question S6W-23433 by Joe FitzPatrick on 13 December 2023, what its response is to reported concerns that (a) local authority planning teams are unable to process planning applications for renewable technologies beyond onshore wind, such as hydrogen, due to gaps in knowledge around these new types of technology and (b) current legislation, including the National Planning Framework provisions of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019, is not keeping up with the development of new technologies.

<u>S6W-24063</u> **Brian Whittle:** To ask the Scottish Government, in light of the Scottish House Condition Survey not taking account of low carbon heating technologies in domestic buildings, such as heat pumps and solar, what consideration it has given to including such types of heating systems in the Scottish House Condition Survey in the future.

<u>S6W-24064</u> **Brian Whittle:** To ask the Scottish Government, further to the answer to question S6W-22664 by Patrick Harvie on 16 November 2023, what its position is on how the proposal that "Owner occupied homes that have ended their use of polluting heating by 2033 will not be required to meet the minimum energy efficiency standard", as set out in its consultation on proposals for a Heat in Buildings Bill, promotes a "fabric first approach".

## **Members' Bills Proposals**

#### **Proposals for Members' Bills**

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
