Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-07485 Martin Whitfield: UNCRC (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill—That the Parliament notes that 16 March 2023 will mark two years since, it considers, the Scottish Parliament committed to delivering a "revolution in children's rights", by unanimously passing the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill; believes that, by taking what it sees as a maximalist approach to incorporating children's rights into Scots law, Scotland would deliver a fundamental cultural shift that would transform the life chances and outcomes for children and young people, including in the South Scotland region; understands that the Bill was passed after over 10 years of campaigning by children, young people and their families, and was supported by children's organisations across Scotland; acknowledges reports that the passage of the Bill was celebrated widely by children and young people through to teachers, social workers, the police, MSPs across all political parties and members of UN committees; accepts that the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom ruled that the Bill needs to be amended to bring it within the competence of the Scottish Parliament; welcomes the Deputy First Minister's commitment to address the Supreme Court judgment through the Scottish Parliament's reconsideration process; acknowledges the view that children and young people still do not know what timescale the Scottish Government is working to, or how long this process will take, and understands that, as the second anniversary of the Bill being passed approaches, charities are urging MSPs to set out to children their continued commitment to the incorporation of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) into Scots law and to supporting reconsideration of the Bill that brings it within the Parliament's competence, and are requesting that the Scottish Government sets out a timescale for the reconsideration process so that children and young people know when UNCRC incorporation will be a reality in their lives.

*<u>S6M-07477</u> Fergus Ewing: Holocaust Memorial Day 2023—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of continuing to impart the lessons of the Holocaust to each generation; considers that the Holocaust was the systematic attempt by a genocidal regime in Europe to murder all Jewish people on the continent between the years 1941 and 1945, with six million men, women and children tragically losing their lives; notes that the annual Holocaust

Memorial Day will be held on 27 January 2023, and that the chosen theme for this year's event is "ordinary people"; recognises that this particular theme has been chosen to highlight the ordinary people who were involved in all elements of, not just the Holocaust, but later genocides including in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur; acknowledges that, to better understand ordinary people, the theme has been subdivided into five categories: perpetrators, bystanders, rescuers, witnesses and crucially, victims; further acknowledges that, according to the theme, particular groups of people do not always belong to just one of the categories, with railway workers cited as an example where some in this job at the time of the Holocaust are considered as perpetrators, for driving trains to concentration camps, and others as rescuers, for hiding Jewish people; understands that the theme can be widened to include ordinary locations and sites, including schools and hospitals, as such buildings can be used to perpetrate genocide; notes that the theme also highlights that there are extraordinary individuals in all genocides, including those who were part of what it considers remarkable efforts to rescue and save the lives of people targeted by murderous regimes, and believes that underpinning the theme is the powerful narrative that everyone living today is an ordinary person, who is able to be extraordinary in their actions through making the choice to challenge prejudice, stand up against hatred, and speak out against identity-based persecution.

*<u>S6M-07472</u> Douglas Lumsden: World Insulin Day Celebrates Professor John Macleod— That the Parliament recognises the new awareness day 23 January as World Insulin Day

That the Parliament recognises the new awareness day, 23 January, as World Insulin Day; believes that this was inspired by the legacy of renowned Aberdeen physiologist Professor John Macleod, an alumnus of Aberdeen Grammar School and Aberdeen University; recognises that the 23 January is the anniversary of the world's first successful dose of clinically useful insulin for the treatment of type 1 diabetes; understands that Professor John Macleod led the University of Toronto team that discovered insulin and was jointly, along with his colleague, Frederick Banting, awarded the 1923 Nobel Prize in Physiology and Medicine; further understands that, on the 23 January 1922, the 14-year-old Leonard Thompson received the first dose of purified Toronto insulin, and that within hours his physical condition improved dramatically, which signalled the team's success at discovering a long-sought and life-saving treatment for diabetes; considers that, sadly, prior to this discovery, those with what is now known as type 1 diabetes typically only survived for a matter of months from their diagnosis; celebrates what it considers this miracle treatment, which, it believes, has saved tens of millions of lives around the world, and welcomes the unveiling of a Professor John Macleod statue in Aberdeen, which is due to take place in Autumn 2023 to coincide with the 100th anniversary of his Nobel Prize. **R**

*<u>S6M-07471</u> Audrey Nicoll: University of Aberdeen Renewables Project Receives £75,000 in

Funding—That the Parliament congratulates the University of Aberdeen on being awarded £75,000 from Scottish Enterprise to support a new renewable energy project; understands that the project, Direct Current Circuit Breaker (LCDC CB), which was developed by the University's School of Engineering, is a new technology for use in direct current (DC) transmission and distribution of electrical power systems, and that this could support other renewables projects; believes that the project is regarded as essential for integrating Scotland's scattered and remote energy sources, and displacing conventional AC-based systems; considers that the research and laboratory tests on hardware prototypes of LCDC CB in the EU Horizon 2020 project promotion have delivered promising results; commends the work of the University of Aberdeen and all those involved in the project, and extends its best wishes for future success.
