S6M-07752 Gillian Martin: Marie Curie's Great Daffodil Appeal 2023—That the Parliament welcomes Marie Curie's Great Daffodil Appeal 2023, which runs throughout March; praises Marie Curie nursing and hospice staff who continue to provide palliative and end of life support, across Scotland in people's homes and in its two hospices in Edinburgh and Glasgow, during challenging times; understands that Marie Curie cared for over 8,660 people during 2021-22; commends the dedication, hard work and contribution of Marie Curie volunteers across Scotland; considers that the COVID-19 pandemic highlighted how important equitable access to palliative and end of life support is for people affected by terminal illness; notes that donations can be given to the appeal, and that daffodil pins are worn in memory of someone who has died; understands that Marie Curie needs to raise £250,000 per week to support its frontline services; commends the vital care and support that Marie Curie provides across Scotland, including in the Aberdeenshire East constituency; praises its information and support services, which are available for everyone affected by terminal illness, including for bereavement support, and its volunteer helper services, which provide vital emotional support, companionship and information to terminally ill people, carers and families; believes that wearing the daffodil pin unites millions of people who believe that dying people should get the care and support that they need; considers that the funds raised will mean a great deal to terminally ill people, and notes the calls encouraging as many people as possible to support the Marie Curie Great Daffodil Appeal in March 2023.

*S6M-08219 Jeremy Balfour: Ensuring that Lothian Late-diagnosed Deaf Children Get the Support That They Need—That the Parliament notes the belief that every child affected by the failings identified in the 2021 audit of NHS Lothian's paediatric audiology service, carried out by the British Academy of Audiology (BAA), must get the support that they need to thrive and to overcome any additional barriers that they face due to the failings identified in the report: understands that the audit did not include children seen later than 2018, which, it considers, means that there were further years until any failings were addressed by an action plan, and that there may be many more children who were not diagnosed in a timely manner; recognises that the key stages for fluent first language development are birth to three years old; understands that the BAA report found that the average age of identification of deafness was 4.5 years for children in the NHS Lothian area, which, it understands, is far longer than comparable figures in the rest of the UK; considers that the failings identified in NHS Lothian's paediatric audiology service will mean that many of the affected children were diagnosed after this critical period and are therefore likely to experience a significant adverse impact on their language and communications development, potentially leaving such children with more complex needs that may need to be addressed though co-ordinated support from health, education, social work and other agencies; understands that the families of affected children have come together to form Families Failed by Lothian Audiology Action Group (FLAAG); further understands that the parents involved in FLAAG have identified a number of areas where their children are not getting the support that they need; understands that the families involved in FLAAG report that they have experienced a lack of access to BSL tutors, speech and language therapy and appropriately qualified professionals to support their deaf children and help remediate any damage caused by the failures of the audiology service, and notes the calls on all public and voluntary sector bodies that are supporting the latediagnosed deaf children in the Lothians and beyond to work together to ensure that they always get the support that they need.

*S6M-08248 Liam McArthur: Dounby Primary School Sculpture on Show at Scottish National Gallery in Edinburgh—That the Parliament congratulates Dounby Primary School, in Orkney, on creating a whole-school art installation, which will go on show at the Scottish National Gallery in spring 2023; understands that Dounby Primary School is only one of four schools in Scotland to be tasked with creating a whole-school installation as part of the project, Your Art World, led by the Creative Learning Network and the National Galleries of Scotland; further understands that *Trashy*, the large 3D figure made of recycled items, inspired by the need to protect Orkney's natural environment and wildlife, will be surrounded by a protective wall of around 140 boxes made by every pupil in the school; recognises that *Trashy* will be joined by small character "Bob", who is currently making a whistle-stop tour of the country, visiting schools and landmarks, including the Scottish Parliament on 30 March 2023, en route to joining the installation in Edinburgh; thanks local businesses, including McAdie and Reeve and Pentland Ferries for their support of the project, and commends everyone at Dounby Primary School on creating such a symbolic project with sustainability at its heart.

*S6M-08247 Richard Leonard: P&O Ferries – One Year Since Staff Dismissal—That the Parliament recalls what it considers to be P&O Ferries' scandalous dismissal of 786 directly-employed UK seafarers on 17 March 2022, including Ratings and Officers directly employed on the Bahamas-flagged ferries, *European Causeway* and *European Highlander*, on the Cairnryan to Larne route, where, it understands, over 100 Ratings jobs are now held by international agency crew and most of whom are paid minimum wage for six-week voyage-only contracts; notes the view of the maritime trade unions that rostering seafarers to work 12-hour days, seven days a

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week, for more than two weeks, causes fatigue and, therefore, poses an increased risk to maritime safety; supports the reported terms and conditions of a collective bargaining agreement for seafarers working for Stena Line on the Cairnryan to Belfast route; notes that the Port of Cairnryan is owned by a company that is part of the P&O Ferries group; supports the calls from the RMT and Nautilus International for mandatory sectoral bargaining through fair pay agreements for seafarers in the ferry industry in Scotland and the UK, and calls on the Scottish Government to work with the trade unions, in 2023 and beyond, to protect seafarer jobs and ferry services in Scotland from what it sees as P&O Ferries' undercutting of pay, roster patterns and wider conditions. **R**

*S6M-08246 Liam McArthur: Orkney Library & Archive Selected for Lend and Mend Hub—That the Parliament congratulates Orkney Library & Archive on being selected as one of the first sites in Scotland to host a Lend and Mend Hub, as part of a pilot project helping to tackle the cost of living crisis; understands that the initiative is funded by the John Lewis Partnership's Circular Future Fund and seeks to establish a network of circular community hubs across the country, which provide free access to repair, reuse, rent and upcycle everyday items; further understands that the initiative will provide the introduction of training sessions and educational workshops to allow people to gain skills and develop knowledge to help promote the environmental benefits of a circular economy; acknowledges what it sees as the many brilliant circular economy initiatives already taking place in Orkney, including by ReStart Orkney, Kirsteen Stewart and Orkney ZeroWaste; commends the award-winning and internationally-acclaimed Orkney Library & Archive for its ongoing innovative efforts to raise awareness of what local libraries and archives have to offer and to open up new ways of accessing these services, and wishes everyone involved all the very best in launching their Lend and Mend Hub later in 2023.
