<u>S6M-12203</u> Shirley-Anne Somerville: Building a New Scotland - Social Security in an Independent Scotland—That the Parliament welcomes the Scotland; agrees that the people of Scotland would be best served by a social security system that embeds dignity, fairness and respect and provides a safety net for all as part of a strong wellbeing economy; notes progress made with Scotland's unique social security benefits, including five family payments, with modelling estimating that 90,000 fewer children will live in relative and absolute poverty in 2023-24 as a result of Scotlah Government policies, with poverty levels 9% lower than they would have otherwise been, but recognises that only independence provides the full range of powers that would enable Scotland to provide the social security that the people of Scotland deserve.

in a strong and growing economy; notes Scotland's devolved social security benefits; acknowledges that delays in processing adult and child disability assessments have left disabled people stuck in limbo and out of pocket during the worst cost of living crisis in decades; notes that the Scottish Government's decision to cut affordable housing budgets by 27% in the face of a housing emergency has been labelled as baffling by organisations like the Joseph Rowntree Foundation; acknowledges that cutting vital funding for affordable housing and employability schemes harms the eradication of the causes of poverty; notes that between 2017 and 2021, 12% of people have remained in persistent poverty after housing costs, and recognises that the paper, *Building a New Scotland: Social security in an independent Scotland*, is the latest in a series of theoretical future plans by the Scottish Government, which has already been too distracted to focus on the here and now and make the devolution of social security work for the people of Scotland."

<u>S6M-11927</u> Gordon MacDonald: Gas and Electricity Standing Charges—That the Parliament understands that standing charges are the fixed component of customers' energy bills, and that Ofgem, the energy regulator for Great Britain, has set the maximum standing charge that a supplier can charge a customer at 29.6 pence per day for gas, 62.08 pence per day for electricity in southern Scotland, and 59.38 pence per day for electricity in northern Scotland; further understands that Scottish consumers using both fuels, including those in the Edinburgh Pentlands constituency, could be paying up to £335 per year before they use any power to heat or light their home; believes that Scottish energy users could be paying 61% more in electricity standing charges than people in London, despite Scotland being what it sees as an energy-rich nation and reportedly generating far more electricity than is used domestically; further believes that Scottish customers are being penalised by a complex and unfair charging system, and notes the calls for the UK Government to scrap standing charges and institute a more equitable price structure.

*<u>S6M-12215</u> Willie Rennie: Crisis in NHS Dentistry—That the Parliament believes that there is a crisis in NHS dentistry; considers that it is deeply concerning that people are finding it increasingly difficult to see an NHS dentist locally, if at all, and in some cases are resorting to DIY dentistry; notes concerns that changes to the payment system, which came into force on 1 November 2023, will do little to stop the exodus of NHS dentists; recalls that the Scottish Government committed in 2021 to abolishing all dentistry charges by the end of the current parliamentary session, but that charges for NHS patients have since increased substantially and been expanded to cover emergency appointments and denture repairs; believes that there must be decisive action to resolve this crisis, and calls, therefore, on the Scottish Government to rewrite the failing NHS Recovery Plan to prioritise workforce planning, boost the number of dentists taking on NHS patients and increase the number of appointments available.

*<u>S6M-12214</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: Improving Access to Primary Care—That the Parliament notes the Scottish Government's longstanding commitment to recruit an extra 800 GPs by 2027 and the views of bodies, including the Royal College of General Practitioners and Audit Scotland, that it is not on track to meet this target; regrets that there is still insufficient access to mental health practitioners working alongside GPs and the £30 million in-year cut to the mental health budget, which Scottish Government documents show will affect primary care; understands that rural and remote communities are among those being severely impacted by high levels of workforce vacancies, presenting barriers to diagnosis, referrals and treatments, and potentially exerting greater pressure on other parts of the NHS, such as accident and emergency, and calls, therefore, on the Scottish Government to rewrite the failed NHS Recovery Plan to get recruitment and retention back on track and to build stronger local health services by expanding the range of services and specialists available, including in mental health and physiotherapy, to meet demand.

*<u>S6M-12211</u> Humza Yousaf: Appointment of Junior Scottish Ministers—That the Parliament agrees that Jim Fairlie and Kaukab Stewart be appointed as junior Scottish Ministers.

*<u>S6M-12210</u> Humza Yousaf: Appointment of Scottish Minister—That the Parliament agrees that Fiona Hyslop be appointed as a Scottish Minister.

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*<u>S6M-12203</u> Shirley-Anne Somerville: Building a New Scotland - Social Security in an

Independent Scotland—That the Parliament welcomes the Scottish Government's paper, *Building a New Scotland: Social security in an independent Scotland*; agrees that the people of Scotland would be best served by a social security system that embeds dignity, fairness and respect and provides a safety net for all as part of a strong wellbeing economy; notes progress made with Scotland's unique social security benefits, including five family payments, with modelling estimating that 90,000 fewer children will live in relative and absolute poverty in 2023-24 as a result of Scottish Government policies, with poverty levels 9% lower than they would have otherwise been, but recognises that only independence provides the full range of powers that would enable Scotland to provide the social security that the people of Scotland deserve.

*S6M-12203.2 Paul O'Kane: Building a New Scotland - Social Security in an Independent Scotland—As an amendment to motion S6M-12203 in the name of Shirley-Anne Somerville (Building a New Scotland - Social Security in an Independent Scotland), leave out from "welcomes" to end and insert "acknowledges that the people of Scotland would be best served by a social security system that embeds dignity, fairness and respect and provides a safety net for all in a strong and growing economy; notes Scotland's devolved social security benefits; acknowledges that delays in processing adult and child disability assessments have left disabled people stuck in limbo and out of pocket during the worst cost of living crisis in decades; notes that the Scottish Government's decision to cut affordable housing budgets by 27% in the face of a housing emergency has been labelled as baffling by organisations like the Joseph Rowntree Foundation; acknowledges that cutting vital funding for affordable housing and employability schemes harms the eradication of the causes of poverty; notes that between 2017 and 2021, 12% of people have remained in persistent poverty after housing costs, and recognises that the paper, Building a New Scotland: Social security in an independent Scotland, is the latest in a series of theoretical future plans by the Scottish Government, which has already been too distracted to focus on the here and now and make the devolution of social security work for the people of Scotland."

*<u>S6M-12192</u> Pam Gosal: East Dunbartonshire Town of Kirkintilloch Named Best Place to Live in Scotland—That the Parliament congratulates the town of Kirkintilloch on being named the best place to live in Scotland in the annual league table collated by the UK's largest independent estate agent, Garrington Property Finders; understands that this league table ranks Scotland's best towns and cities according to four main criteria, including natural beauty, wellbeing, employment and connectivity; understands that the town sits near the foot of the Campsie Fells and is known as the "Canal Capital of Scotland"; further understands that the town's history dates back two millennia, to Roman times; understands that over 160 communities across Scotland were ranked in this table, and that East Dunbartonshire took three of the top 20 entries, with Milngavie coming in number seven and Bishopbriggs coming in at number 20, and considers that this success reflects the vibrancy and depth of appeal across East Dunbartonshire as a whole.

*<u>S6M-12191</u> Rachael Hamilton: Scotland's Farming Recognised at NFUS Dinner—That the Parliament recognises the highest quality of Scottish produce on show at the National Farmers Union Scotland (NFUS) annual dinner on 8 February 2024; understands that this dinner attracts over 400 attendees, conveying what it considers to be the world-leading food and drink that Scotland produces; further understands that over £4,500 was raised by diners for Scottish rural charities, and notes that farming and crofting stakeholders across Scotland were commended for their excellence within the sector, as well as for being the lynchpin of rural communities and Scotland's rural economy, during an awards ceremony that showcased Scotland's agricultural talent and what it sees as its significant contribution to the nation's economic growth.

*<u>S6M-12188</u> Bob Doris: Every Moment Matters for Babies Born with Spinal Muscular

Atrophy—That the Parliament understands that spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) is a debilitating genetic condition that damages the motor nerves in the spinal cord, leading to progressive muscle degeneration and severely restricted movement, which affects around 70 babies born across the UK every year; commends the work of patient advocacy organisations, such as SMA UK and the Genetic Alliance, in supporting families affected by and raising awareness of the condition; understands that disease modifying treatments are available that can help prevent disease progression, with the greatest impact being where it is possible to begin treatment before symptoms show; further understands that SMA can be added to the list of conditions screened for in the current newborn bloodspot test to identify the condition and inform treatment decisions at the earliest stage; considers that the majority of babies born in the European Union are screened for SMA at birth; believes that Scotland has the opportunity to move into line with many countries across Europe, including the Republic of Ireland, that already screen for SMA; understands that the UK National Screening Committee has committed to reviewing the case for SMA screening, and urges all governments across the UK, including the Scottish Government, to work closely together to deliver equitable SMA newborn screening as speedily as possible.

*<u>S6M-12186</u> Kate Forbes: Change Mental Health Marks 30th Anniversary in Lochaber—That the Parliament congratulates Change Mental Health on 30 years of delivering mental health
