*S6M-12237 Audrey Nicoll: The Economic Impact of Scotland's Renewable Energy Sector -**2023 Update—**That the Parliament welcomes the publication of the Fraser of Allander Institute report, The Economic Impact of Scotland's Renewable Energy Sector – 2023 Update, commissioned by Scottish Renewables, which, it understands, provides the latest estimates of economic output and job figures for Scotland's renewable energy industry; understands that the report demonstrates that Scotland's renewable energy industry and its supply chain supported more than 42,000 full-time equivalent jobs in 2021, with offshore wind supporting the most employment across Scotland's economy from the renewable energy sector for the first time, with 15,005 full-time equivalent roles, while onshore wind supported 12,030 full-time equivalent roles and renewable heat supported 7,220 full-time equivalent roles; recognises the report's estimate that Scotland's renewable energy industry supported over £10.1 billion of output in 2021, with offshore wind contributing, it understands, the largest estimated economic output of £4 billion, followed by onshore wind and hydropower, generating £3.4 billion and £1.2 billion respectively, and welcomes the continued growth of Scotland's renewable energy industry, which, it believes, is critical not only for achieving Scotland's energy security and net zero ambitions, but also for building a greener, growing economy that benefits communities across Scotland, including in the Aberdeen South and North Kincardine constituency.

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categories; notes that, with a past dating back two millennia to Roman times, Kirkintilloch, which is just nine miles from central Glasgow, secured a high ranking in the wellbeing category, which, it understands, was helped by its air quality; celebrates that the town, which is surrounded by rolling hills with the picturesque Campsie Fells on its doorstep and an abundance of canal walks, also scored high for natural beauty, while the competitiveness of its house prices, which, it understands, are £276,000 on average, compared to the regional average, supported its high ranking in the value for money category; commends the local community for its well-deserved pride in the area, and sends every best wish for the future.

*S6M-12204 Maggie Chapman: United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East—That the Parliament commends the work of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA), which began its operations on 1 May 1950; understands that this work comprises human development and humanitarian services, including primary and vocational education, primary health care, relief and social services, infrastructure and camp improvement, microfinance and emergency responses, including in situations of armed conflict; believes that the work of UNRWA is especially vital at this time when, between 7 October 2023 and 7 February 2024, over 27,000 Palestinians have reportedly been killed in the Gaza Strip, according to the Ministry of Health in Gaza, with around 70% of those killed reported to be women and children, and over 67,000 people reported to be injured; understands that, according to UNRWA's own figures, over 75% of the population have been displaced across the Gaza Strip, with at least one million people living in or near emergency or informal shelters; further understands that, according to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, over 300 people have been killed in the West Bank; understands that UNRWA is providing essential services, including shelters, water and sanitation, medical consultations, child vaccinations, psychosocial support for displaced individuals and families, and food distribution, despite the severe impact of war on its premises and the people within them; mourns the loss of over 150 UNRWA workers who have reportedly been killed since the beginning of hostilities; understands with disappointment and severe regret that several states, including the UK, USA and other key donors and longstanding partners, have suspended funding for UNWRA, based on what it sees as unsubstantiated allegations against a very small number of the agency's staff; believes that this suspension is an entirely disproportionate response, and that both UNWRA and the UN have responded rapidly and robustly to the allegations; further believes, with deep sadness, that, unless funding is quickly restored, UNWRA will be obliged to suspend its operations, leading to an ever deeper humanitarian disaster, more deaths, including those of children, and increased instability in the region, and urges the UK and other states to restore funding as a matter of the utmost urgency.

*S6M-12160 Karen Adam: Celebrating Scotland and Banffshire and Buchan Coast as Premier Locations for Film and TV Production—That the Parliament celebrates what it sees as the ongoing success of Scotland, and Banffshire and Buchan Coast, as premiere locations for film and TV production; recognises what it sees as the positive economic and community benefits that this industry brings to Scotland at both local and national levels; notes that recent film and TV productions in Banffshire and Buchan Coast include the Steven Spielberg and Tom Hanks production, *Masters of the Air*, based on the non-fiction book by Donald L Miller; understands that Masters of the Air tells the true story of an American bomber squadron during the Second World War and features the Banffshire and Buchan Coast town of Fraserburgh in the second episode of the Apple TV production; notes that the beautiful Banffshire and Buchan Coast village of Portnockie, with its much-photographed Bow Fiddle Rock, starred in the finale of BBC's Traitors series, and that it is set to feature in the American series of the same name; understands that this has led to a marked increase in tourists to the Portnockie and Cullen area: believes that this filming adds to the recent starring role of Portsoy in the finale of *Peaky Blinders*, of Peterhead Prison as the prime location of the TV series, Screw, and of Macduff starring in the Netflix production of *The Crown*; further believes that there is a considerable potential for increased sustainable tourism and future film production in the Banffshire and Buchan Coast area, as well as across Scotland as a whole, and encourages people to visit the area and see for themselves why this corner of Scotland has become so popular for film production.

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which has been described as one of the greatest miscarriages of justice in the UK's history; applauds the reported announcement of legislation to exonerate and compensate all those who were affected; believes that more must be done to swiftly exonerate all those who were affected, as, it understands, fewer than 100 convictions have been overturned to date, and calls on the public Post Office Horizon IT Inquiry to ensure that those who it considers covered up this scandal are held accountable, so that what it sees as this grave failure of justice can never be repeated.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.

As soon as a Public Bill (i.e. a Government, Committee or Member's Bill) has completed Stage 1, amendments for consideration at Stage 2 may be lodged; and as soon as Stage 2 is completed, amendments for Stage 3 consideration may be lodged. The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
