*<u>S6M-11781</u> James Dornan: Calling for SFA Transparency—That the Parliament supports recent reported moves by Glasgow Rangers FC to get the Scottish Football Association (SFA) to release the conversations by video assistant referee (VAR) officials during the recent game against Celtic FC; recognises what it sees as the longstanding culture of secrecy that exists within the ruling hierarchy of Scottish football; urges the SFA to ensure that all VAR decisions, and any other decisions requested by a club involved, are made publicly available on such a request, and believes that, if the SFA and Scottish Professional Football League (SPFL) continue with what it considers is their ongoing culture of secrecy, then there is a need to consider an independent regulator for football, similar to the plans reportedly due to be introduced into the UK Parliament, but one which would be unique to the circumstances of Scottish football.

*S6M-11780 Richard Leonard: Keeping the Guard on ScotRail—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the important role that guards play on the ScotRail network; notes that they have responsibilities for a wide range of safety-critical areas, to keep passengers and railways safe, including by preventing and responding to emergencies, preventing and deterring assaults, including sexual assaults, dealing with anti-social behaviour, providing assistance to disabled and older passengers and providing security; further notes that research into women and girls' safety on public transport, which was published by the Scottish Government in 2023, found that the presence of staff on board trains and at stations made women and girls feel safer, and recommended that the Scottish Government increase staffing, including on board services; understands that the model of train operation known as Driver Only Operation (DOO) removes the guarantee of a second member of staff on board services; is opposed, therefore, to any further extension of DOO on the ScotRail network; notes, with concern, reports from the National Union of Rail Maritime and Transport Workers (RMT) that ScotRail has proposed to roll out DOO on the newly-electrified Barrhead line; believes that any extension of DOO will discourage the public, particularly women, disabled people and older people, from using rail services and may encourage them to use less environmentally forms of transport, and considers, therefore, that the Scottish Government and ScotRail should commit to no further extension of DOO on Scotland's railway. and reintroduce guards onto services currently operated via DOO. R

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*<u>S6M-11779</u> Alexander Burnett: Gordon Rural Action Receives £50,000 from UK

Government Community Ownership Fund—That the Parliament congratulates Gordon Rural Action on receiving £50,000 in funding from the UK Government Community Ownership Fund; notes that this is part of an £8 million fund from the UK Government to 17 community projects in Scotland to help to transform town centres throughout the country; understands that this funding will be used by Gordon Rural Action to secure the future of the Bikery shop and workshop in Huntly; further understands that the Bikery will sell new and recycled bikes and parts at a discounted price and will also offer maintenance and repairs through its workshop; commends that Gordon Rural Action will also provide a training space for trainee mechanics and young people to learn new skills in the Bikery; believes that this is an excellent project that will bring substantial benefit to the local community, and wishes it every success.

*<u>S6M-11777</u> Rachael Hamilton: Stuart Hogg Named in King's New Year Honours—That the Parliament congratulates Stuart Hogg on being named in His Majesty the King's New Year Honours list; understands that the Borders-born former Scotland international rugby player has been appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) for services to rugby union football; notes that, over the course of his career, he has made 190 appearances in club rugby, scoring 332 points, and has been capped for the Scotland first team 100 times; understands that the former Scotland full-back played a vital role in Scotland's evolution in international rugby, achieving wins against those at the top of the Six Nations table on many occasions; notes that the Scottish rugby player has often returned to his roots and been involved with helping a number of local rugby clubs across the Borders, showing his community engagement, and wishes all those named in the Honours list well for 2024.

*<u>S6M-11774</u> Alexander Stewart: Cathy Magee OBE—That the Parliament congratulates Catherine Elizabeth (Cathy) Magee, who is Chief Executive Officer of Dyslexia Scotland, on being

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appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in His Majesty the King's New Year Honours List 2024 for services to people with dyslexia, and commends Ms Magee, and Dyslexia Scotland, on their sterling work in this regard.

*S6M-11770 John Mason: Mosque Alterations and Demolitions in China—That the Parliament recognises the reports of what it sees as the emerging troubling trend affecting the Hui Muslim community in China; acknowledges the reports of mosque alterations and demolitions across the country and of these raising concerns about religious freedom, cultural assimilation and human rights violations; understands that widespread alterations to mosques are underway across China, with the government reportedly claiming that these are renovation efforts to modernise and harmonise such religious sites with Chinese culture; notes, however, reports that these are being perceived as a direct assault on religious practices, leading to increased tensions and protests: acknowledges reported satellite imagery revealing that at least 1,714 mosques have been altered, stripped or destroyed over the last five years, particularly within regions with a high population of ethnic groups practising Islam, specifically in Ningxia and Gansu, and that over 80% to 90% of mosques with Islamic architecture are being altered; understands that Human Rights Watch sees these reported alterations as violations of freedom of religion, as set out in the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights; further understands that China is home to an estimated 20 million Muslims, with over half belonging to the Hui ethnic group, and that there is reportedly a fear among Hui Muslims that the gradual suppression of religion could lead to a future without Islam in China, particularly impacting younger generations; considers that the situation in China prompts critical questions about the protection of religious freedoms, and hopes that the international community closely observes these developments, considers the broader implications for religious and cultural diversity in the country, and raises these issues with the Chinese government as appropriate.

*<u>S6M-11768</u> Clare Adamson: Simon Community Safe Place Appeal—That the Parliament commends the Simon Community on its Safe Place appeal, which aims to directly support people through its Lanarkshire services; understands that the charity is looking to raise over £200,000 to provide housing support, including crisis intervention and resettlement, to those either facing homelessness or who are homeless; notes that the Simon Community Scotland (SCS) is Scotland's largest provider of homeless support services; understands that it is currently working with 84 people in Lanarkshire, who are at risk of losing their homes, 24 people living in SCS

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accommodation services, including a dedicated female-only service for those who have experienced domestic abuse, mental health or addiction issues, and that, in partnership with Barnardos and Blue Triangle, it supports a further 50 people; commends the work and support of the SCS staff and volunteers, and thanks them for their commitment to helping those during what can be their most challenging and darkest times.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
