Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-12360 Christine Grahame: Phasing Out Farrowing Crates—That the Parliament notes with concern reports that most indoor bred sows in Scotland are confined to farrowing crates for weeks and that, during that time, in a very restricted space that they cannot turn around in or perform highly motivated behaviours, including building a nest and caring for their piglets; understands that, in 2015, the Farmed Animal Welfare Committee recommended that farrowing crates be phased out; further understands that the British Veterinary Association has identified the use of farrowing crates as a priority animal welfare problem for the year 2023-24; understands that the European Food Safety Authority has concluded that sows can be kept in free-farrowing systems without increasing piglet mortality and recommended that farrowing crates should not be used, for animal welfare reasons; notes that the Scottish Government's Programme for Government 2021-22 included a commitment to consult on phasing out farrowing crates, which it considers has not been fulfilled; understands that most people in Scotland, including in the Midlothian South, Tweeddale and Lauderdale constituency and across the South Scotland region, want to see the use of farrowing crates ended; notes the longstanding calls from animal welfare organisations, including OneKind, for an end to farrowing crates, and further notes the view that the Agriculture and Rural Communities (Scotland) Bill and the National Good Food Nation Plan could provide policy levers that would support and incentivise farmers in a just transition to freefarrowing systems.

*<u>S6M-12368</u> Colin Beattie: Recognition for Cherry Road Centre in Bonnyrigg—That the Parliament congratulates Bonnyrigg's Cherry Road Centre, which supports people with learning disabilities; notes the recognition recently received in the prestigious American publication, *Harper's Magazine*, in the article entitled, *A letter from Bonnyrigg*; recognises the positive comments praising Cherry Road's workshops; further recognises that the article highlights the outstanding work being undertaken by staff; acknowledges the role of Artlink in creating the workshops at Cherry Road, which are designed for people with learning disabilities; commends this work, which it believes can have a life-changing impact on those involved, and wishes the

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centre's service users and staff, who provide much needed support, continued success long into the future.

*<u>S6M-12367</u> Murdo Fraser: Gleneagles Hotel Named as Best Hotel in Scotland and the UK— That the Parliament congratulates Gleneagles Hotel on being named Hotel of the Year (Best Places to Stay in the UK) 2024 by *The Times* and *The Sunday Times*; notes that the Perthshire hotel was also named Scotland Hotel of the Year; further notes that the judges praised how its estate "weaves its heritage playfully through a stay, from the bars to the bedrooms, and yet the overall experience feels fresh, relevant and typified by exceptional service"; recognises that Gleneagles Hotel, which was originally hailed as the "Riviera of the Highlands", will celebrate its centenary in June 2024, and wishes everyone associated with Gleneagles Hotel all the best for the future.

*S6M-12365 Emma Harper: Sanguhar Becomes the Latest Biosphere Town - That the Parliament congratulates the town of Sanguhar on becoming the 10th Biosphere Community to be designated within the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere since the region was awarded UNESCO status in 2012: understands that the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Partnership is a charitable organisation, supported by funders including South of Scotland Enterprise and Dumfries and Galloway Council, and that the Biosphere Communities scheme invites local people to explore the aspects of heritage and cultural identity that most inspire community pride, with a "Sense of Place" workshop in which favourite places, leisure activities and scenic spots are shared; understands that the workshop output is collated into a destination page for the Biosphere's website, and features on Scotland's UNESCO Trail, promoting slow, sustainable tourism between what it considers to be the country's world-class visitor attractions; notes that businesses in and around Sanguhar are expected to benefit from their new connection through destination marketing that promotes Biosphere Communities as places where visitors from near and far can enjoy nature-based experiences and a taste of "Biosphere life"; recognises that the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO region has attracted multiple tourism accolades for its unique offering in recent months, having been featured in Rough Guides, Wanderlust, Lonely Planet, and National Geographic Traveller magazines; believes confidently that the UNESCO connection will benefit Sanguhar through the Biosphere's partnerships with VisitScotland and the South of Scotland Destination Alliance, which promote the region; notes that Sanguhar's local heritage includes the ruins of the Crichton family's historic seat, the world's oldest working Post Office, opened in 1712, and Crawick Multiverse, the "cosmic artland" created by Charles Jencks; appreciates that the town attracts walkers and cyclists all year round with its position on the Southern Upland Way, amid the magnificent landscapes of Upper Nithsdale, and wishes all the best to the many individuals and organisations that have worked to launch this latest Biosphere town.

*<u>S6M-12364</u> Gordon MacDonald: Wester Hailes Station to be Adopted—That the Parliament welcomes the adoption of Wester Hailes Station as part of ScotRail's Adopt a Station scheme; understands that Wester Hailes Community Trust has been taking the initiative forward, recruiting community volunteers to enrol in the scheme for the station; notes that the scheme involves activities such as building station gardens, installing information boards and other creative ideas to improve the look and feel of train stations; wishes Wester Hailes Community Trust well in its work to draw up planting plans and secure funding for the project; acknowledges what it considers to be the positive impact of the ScotRail Adopt a Station scheme in improving the physical environment of stations across the country; celebrates that more than 200 ScotRail stations and over 1,000

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volunteers are, it understands, now part of the Adopt a Station volunteering programme, and encourages other groups across Scotland, such as charities, schools and business, to join the scheme and adopt their local station.

*<u>S6M-12363</u> Pauline McNeill: Paying Tribute to Steve Cheyne—That the Parliament notes, with regret, the sad passing of Steve Cheyne; believes that Mr Cheyne was a much-loved and significant figure in Glasgow's music scene for many years, having run the famous Berkeley 2 studios since the 1980s; understands that many famous artists, including Beyoncé, Franz Ferdinand and Deacon Blue used the rehearsal spaces that Steve Cheyne created; recognises what it sees as the major contribution that he made to what it considers to be the thriving music industry in Glasgow over many years, and believes that he will be sorely missed by all those he helped and supported in the music industry and all who knew him.

*S6M-12361 Liam McArthur: Orkney Success at the Current Archaeology Awards—That the Parliament congratulates all the archaeologists involved at the Ness of Brodgar, which has been awarded Research Project of the Year for a second time at the Current Archaeology Live! Conference 2024: understands that the Ness of Brodgar site is a complex of Neolithic structures on the Orkney Mainland, described as "without parallel in Atlantic Europe"; considers that the excavation of this 5,000-year-old site, which has been ongoing since 2004, has proceeded according to the careful application of long-term principles; commends the meticulous work that has been done over two decades to excavate the site and increase knowledge and understanding of Neolithic Europe; notes that among the finds at the site are over 1,000 decorated stone artefacts and evidence of elaborate adornments like coloured walls and tiling, which, together with the scale of the complex, creates a picture of an elaborate and vibrant culture in Neolithic Orkney; congratulates Nick Card, the Project Director at the Ness, who was awarded Archaeologist of the Year; understands that Nick's geophysical surveys were what detected the Ness complex, an achievement he has called "the highlight of my career", and that his leadership has guided the excavation of the site since 2004; recognises that the Ness is part of the "Heart of Neolithic Orkney", which is one of Scotland's six UNESCO World Heritage sites; congratulates the archaeologists involved in the Knowe of Swandro site, in Rousay, whose receipt of Rescue Project of the Year made the Current Archaeology Awards a triple Orkney success; notes that the Knowe of Swandro, also an important Neolithic site with additional Iron Age, Pictish, and Viking buildings, sits partly below a high tide marker and is being rapidly eroded; considers that the work that has been done in this "race against time and tide" to recover the heritage of the site makes the Knowe of Swandro team worthy of the award; believes that Orkney's archaeological heritage is incredibly valuable, and thanks all of those, including a large number of volunteers, who work to preserve it.

*<u>S6M-12356</u> Ruth Maguire: Scottish Sports Futures Youth Worker of Year Award — That the Parliament congratulate Irvine's Zara Kirkwood on winning Scottish Sports Futures (SSF) Youth Worker of Year award; understands that Zara engaged with SSF as a young person before moving on to volunteer and subsequently becoming a staff member, where she uses her lived experience to support young people in her care; considers that SSF enables young people to be healthier, more confident and more resilient, so that they are better prepared to combat the effects of poverty, trauma, and adversity; congratulates Zara on her award, and wishes her every success in the future.

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*<u>S6M-12355</u> Ruth Maguire: National Recognition for Irvine Judo Volunteer—That the Parliament congratulates Irvine's Nicola Brawley on being awarded Volunteer of the Year by JudoScotland; understands that Nicola volunteers her time at Irvine Judo Club, where she works hard to ensure that the club operates smoothly; recognises that Nicola organises a Judo Girls Rock session in Irvine, which is a participation programme aimed at bridging the gender gap in judo, particularly among young females; considers that the initiative not only promotes inclusivity within the sport, but also addresses what it sees as the broader issue of female underrepresentation in physical activity programmes, both locally and nationally; congratulates Nicola on her award-winning effort, and wishes her every success in the future.

*S6M-12353 John Mason: COVID-19 Vaccines—That the Parliament welcomes reports that mortality rates from COVID-19 declined among care home residents following the roll-out of vaccinations, according to a study by academics from Glasgow and Edinburgh universities; understands that they analysed data on infections and deaths recorded in care homes from March 2020 to October 2021, and found that the death rate from COVID-19 per 1,000 beds fell from 45.8 between March and August 2020 to 29.3 from September 2020 to May 2021; notes that, from June to October 2021, when the vast majority of residents had been fully vaccinated, it had been reduced to 3.5: believes that this is the first study of its kind in Scotland to illustrate the impact of vaccinations on care home residents specifically, as opposed to the elderly population in general; understands that the study is also the first to examine the characteristics of care home COVID-19 outbreaks in Scotland beyond June 2020, as protections such as routine testing and access to PPE improved, and staff were less likely to be working across multiple premises; considers that this study is especially important as it undermines what it sees as the misinformation and disinformation around COVID-19 and vaccines; thanks all involved in developing the vaccines in extremely challenging circumstances; sympathises with all those who lost loved ones during the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly those in care homes, and thanks all healthcare and scientific workers for what it sees as their continuing dedication and service following the COVID-19 outbreak.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
