S6M-17428 Karen Adam: Thomas Blake Glover, Fraserburgh's International Legacy—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the extraordinary global contribution of Thomas Blake Glover, a pioneering Scottish merchant and industrialist, who was born on 6 June 1838 in Fraserburgh, at what is now known as Glover Garden on Commerce Street, and who was the son of the town's harbour master; acknowledges Thomas Blake Glover's key role in 19th century Japan, where he supported the Choshu Five, a group of young scholars whose work helped shape modern Japanese governance, industry and education, including the introduction of sign language; notes his pivotal contribution to the establishment of the Mitsubishi Corporation and his influence in the development of Japan's shipbuilding and industrial sectors; celebrates the enduring cultural and economic links between Scotland and Japan that it believes Thomas Blake Glover helped to foster, including the internationally renowned Glover Garden in Nagasaki; recognises the contemporary relevance of his legacy in Fraserburgh, where offshore wind turbines, visible from the coast and maintained at the harbour where Thomas Blake Glover's father served, include parts manufactured by Mitsubishi; acknowledges what it sees as this powerful link between Fraserburgh's maritime heritage and its current role in the global energy transition; welcomes the development of Fraserburgh's own Glover Garden as a symbol of education, pride and international friendship, and wishes every success to the organisers and attendees of the inaugural Thomas Blake Glover Festival, taking place on 8 June 2025, in the hope that it will become a lasting annual celebration of Fraserburgh's unique contribution to global history.

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-17700 Alexander Stewart: Revitalising High Streets—That the Parliament acknowledges what it sees as the vital importance of Scotland's towns' and cities' high streets, including in the Mid Scotland and Fife region; understands that Scotland's retail industry employs almost 230,000 people of all ages and abilities in more than 22,000 shops, which collectively produce a turnover of £27 billion per annum; further understands that Scotland's retailers have donated and raised over £100 million for Scottish good causes since 2016, whilst Scottish retail contributes around £525 million in tax revenue; believes that retailers wish to work with the Scottish Government to deliver net zero, thus building a more circular economy whilst creating a far healthier Scotland; notes the view that there is a pressing need for a visible and effective high street police presence, especially in relation to reports of rising rates of theft and shop worker abuse; further notes the calls from high street business owners for more investment into transport infrastructure, to give apprenticeship levy payers access to skills training on the basis of those contributions, as well as to review all public sector bodies to assess whether there are opportunities for the identification of efficiencies, and notes the calls from retailers to universally revitalise high streets, which, it believes, have the potential, if nurtured, to be accessible for all, in addition to being safe, diverse, vibrant and attractive places for both residents and visitors alike.

*S6M-17800 Willie Rennie: Condolences on the Death of Sir Bob Reid—That the Parliament expresses its deepest condolences following the death of Sir Bob Reid; acknowledges that he held important positions in various companies, most notably at Shell and as CEO at British Rail in 1990, overseeing projects, including the Channel Tunnel; believes that Sir Bob had strong leadership skills and was admired for his energy and enthusiasm, as well as having a liking for human contact and an easy manner, regardless of rank; notes that Sir Bob was born in Cupar and later studied politics, economics and history at the University of St Andrews, where he represented the university at golf and met his future wife; understands that, despite losing his right hand in an accident at his father's butcher's shop as a child, Sir Bob went on to great business and sporting success; believes that his loss is felt widely, and expresses sympathy to his friends and family following the sad news of his passing.

*S6M-17797 Rachael Hamilton: Celebrating G J Sanderson's Success at the 2025 World Haggis Awards—That the Parliament congratulates G J Sanderson, which is a family-run butchers based in Coldstream, on being crowned the producer of the best haggis in south-east Scotland at the 2025 World Haggis Awards; believes that this highly regarded accolade reflects the team's outstanding craftsmanship, commitment to traditional methods and deep-rooted passion for Scotland's national dish; notes that the World Haggis Awards are held annually to

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celebrate excellence in haggis-making across the country and that competition in the south-east Scotland category was particularly strong this year; recognises the efforts of Graham Sanderson and his dedicated team in maintaining consistently high standards, which have earned them both local appreciation and national recognition; understands that G J Sanderson's success is not only a source of pride for the business and its loyal customers, but also for the wider Borders community, and recognises what it sees as the importance of supporting local food producers who contribute significantly to Scotland's rich culinary heritage and rural economy.

*S6M-17796 Martin Whitfield: Celebrating 250 Years of Building Societies —That the Parliament recognises the 250th anniversary of the founding of the world's first building society, established in Birmingham in 1775, marking the beginning of the mutual finance movement and what it sees as a pivotal moment in the development of ethical, community-focused financial services; considers that this anniversary represents an opportunity to celebrate the enduring value of building societies and credit unions in providing accessible savings and affordable lending options to individuals and families across Scotland and the UK; believes that building societies have played a crucial role in helping generations of people into home ownership, providing financial resilience during economic downturns, and embedding local decision-making in the heart of financial services; acknowledges the presence of six building societies operating in Scotland, including Scottish Building Society, Cumberland, Leeds, Nationwide, Skipton, and Yorkshire, all with, it believes, a strong high street presence and customer base, contributing to the vibrancy of Scotland's towns and cities; recognises that Scotland is home to three major credit unions, Glasgow, Capital, and Scotwest, with a combined membership exceeding 126,000 people; welcomes what it sees as the inclusive, community-led ethos of credit unions, which, it believes, offer lifeline support to many households facing high-cost credit or banking exclusion, particularly in areas of social deprivation; considers that, with over 126,000 members across the three Scottish credit unions, and six building societies with a presence on Scottish high streets, and over 21 million members across the UK, mutualised financial services play an important role in the lives of many of those in the region of South Scotland and of people across the country; believes that credit unions and building societies reinvest profits for the benefit of their members and local communities, playing a valuable role in promoting financial wellbeing, economic empowerment, and reducing inequality; recognises what it sees as the importance of protecting and strengthening Scotland's mutual sector as part of building a fairer economy, and calls for continued support to ensure that building societies and credit unions can thrive and innovate in a changing financial landscape, particularly in support of affordable housing, community wealth-building, and ethical banking practices.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
