Note by the clerk

Introduction

- 1. Predecessor committees have taken a longstanding interest in the lives of Gypsy/Travellers in Scotland, with a number of inquiries being conducted in previous parliamentary sessions.
- 2. In March 2021, in its <u>legacy report</u> (paragraphs 78 to 82), the Session 5 Equalities and Human Rights Committee summarised the work it had undertaken and noted the establishment of a Ministerial Working Group to determine priorities for action to make positive changes to the lives of Gypsy/Travellers.
- 3. The joint action plan by the Scottish Government and COSLA was published in 2019.
- 4. The Session 5 committee noted there was "still more progress to be made" and recommended its successor committee monitors progress on implementation of the joint action plan.
- 5. This evidence session will therefore focus principally on progress of the implementation of the joint action plan and the five key themes within it—
 - accommodation
 - access to public services
 - better incomes
 - tackling racism and discrimination
 - improving Gypsy/Traveller representation.
- 6. There will also be an opportunity to discuss any impacts of the pandemic and the restrictions brought about by it, as well as impacts on Gypsy/Traveller communities more broadly as they pertain to recent news events.
