### Healthcare in Remote and Rural Areas Inquiry: Evidence session with academics

#### Note by the clerk

#### Background

1. This is the second oral evidence session of the Committee's inquiry into remote and rural healthcare.
2. The Committee has agreed that the aim of the inquiry should be to consider the views of remote, rural and island communities, and the workforce, with a view to informing future Scottish Government policy in this area, including the Scottish Government's [Remote and Rural Workforce Strategy](#) and the development of the [National Centre for Remote and Rural Health and Care](#).
3. The Committee has already undertaken two consultation exercises for this inquiry – one using the [Your Priorities](#) platform and a more targeted call for views using [Citizen Space](#). World clouds which describe the main themes highlighted through these consultation exercises are provided at **Annexe A**.
4. In October 2023, the Scottish Government and NHS Education for Scotland (NES) launched the [National Centre for Remote and Rural Health and Care](#). NES states that the goal of the Centre is to:
  - support the delivery of improved care for remote, rural and island communities across Scotland
  - reduce remote, rural and island health and wellbeing inequalities
  - achieve this through focused work on improving the sustainability, capacity, and capability of remote, rural and island primary care and community-based workforce and service delivery

NES is leading work to establish the Centre and has said that the initial focus of the Centre will be on the provision of primary care and community services.

5. The Scottish Government published a [Health and social care: national workforce strategy](#) in March 2022. It sets out the vision for the Health and Social Care Workforce as follows:

“A sustainable, skilled workforce with attractive career choices and fair work where all are respected and valued for the work they do”

This included a commitment to developing a Remote and Rural workforce recruitment strategy by the end of 2024. It is intended that this will provide a framework which will support employers to ensure that the Health and Social Care needs of people who live in remote and rural communities are met.

## Today’s meeting

6. At the meeting Members will hear from representatives from academics with expertise in rural sexual health, nursing, geriatric care, delivery of rural healthcare and wider issues impacting healthcare in rural and remote areas.
7. The following academics will be giving evidence:
  - **Dr Rebecah MacGilleEathain** – Research Fellow in the Division of Rural Health and Wellbeing at the University of the Highlands and Islands. Her interests include sexual and reproductive health of young people in remote and rural areas.
  - **Professor Annetta Smith** – Non-Executive Director at NHS Eileanan Siar and former Professor of Nursing/Head of Department at University of the Highlands and Islands. Previous research interests include older people care and access to remote and rural healthcare and education delivery.
  - **Dr Stephen Makin** – Geriatrician with clinical practice at Caithness General Hospital and clinical research fellow at the University of Edinburgh. Interests include delivery of healthcare to frail and elderly patients in remote and rural areas.
